HEARING SET FOR HIXSON ON APRIL 8

A preliminary hearing in the first degree murder charges against Wilbur Hixson, 20-year-old Indian, has been set for April 8 by Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner.

Hixson was arraigned Saturday. He is not eligible to bond because of the nature of the charges, which grew out of the fatal shooting of his ex-stepfather, Abner McNair.

J. C. O'Neill, attorney for Hixson, asked for a preliminary hearing. Charles C. Hoskins of the Indians officer service, and John McCulloch, of the FBI, were present at the arraignment, and stated they had not yet completed their investigations and were not prepared for a preliminary hearing Saturday.

For one thing, the officers indicated, they are seeking to establish definitely whether the shooting of McNair occurred on the Klamath reservation.

The house where McNair was killed is near the extreme eastern boundary of the reservation. There, according to a story related by Hixson to officers, McNair and Hixson had an argument in the kitchen, resulting in gunplay.

O'Neill indicated Hixson's defense will be that he shot McNair to defend his own life.

Modoc Point Man Attacked, Robbed By Two Young Men

Ed Johnson of Modoc Point advised city police officers he was attacked by two young men at 11:55 p. m. Saturday on South Ninth street between Klamath and Walnut avenues.

One of the men struck him in the mouth, Johnson said while the other jumped on him and held him down. In the meanwhile the first young man went through Johnson's pockets, it was learned, and took \$3 in silver, cards and personal papers.

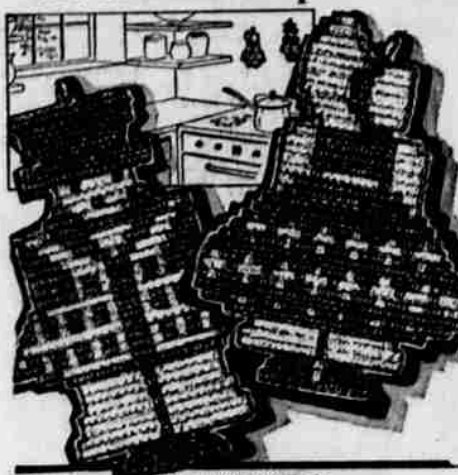

Average American to Pay Defense Bill, Says Writer

NEW YORK, March 31 (The Special News Service)—Who must pay the costs of national defense?

How much of the bill for airplanes, battleships, tanks and aid to Britain will come out of your pocketbook?

Those are the questions which the house and ways and means committee must answer as it sits down shortly to work out new tax measures to finance the defense program.

You'll never know exactly how much it costs you, because many of the taxes you pay will probably be included in the cost of articles you buy.

But one thing is certain, tax experts say—the average American with a moderate or small income is headed for a rendezvous with the tax collector the likes of which he has never seen before.

The old formula of "tax the rich" won't be sufficient this time. The simple reason is that all the wealthy people in the country put together don't earn enough to pay for expenditures of the size we are now making. On top of normal peacetime deficits, we have tacked an armament program, estimates of which now exceed \$30,000,000,000. Then we have promised to aid Britain which totals \$7,000,000,000 just as a starter. In the United States most of the national income goes to people with relatively small annual earnings. About two-thirds of it goes to individuals who make less than \$3,000 a year. People making as much as \$10,000 a year or more get only a relatively small share of the national earnings, and this share is already heavily loaded with taxes.

If the government should take every cent of income above \$10,000 a year, experts say it would add less than \$3,000,000,000 a year to present revenues.

The problem is complicated, however, by the fact that the average American—even though he is entirely unaware of it—is already bearing a fairly heavy tax load.
