STOCK MARKET DAMPENED BY WAR OUTLOOK

NEW YORK, March 31 (P)—Specialties worked up a little rally in today's stock market but most leaders shuffled over an irregular narrow route.

While an assortment of preferreds managed to get up as much as a point or so, many others in the "pivotal" classification were hard put to it to cling to minor fractions.

Utility common stocks, many of which lately have hovered in low territory for the past year or so, improved slightly as an S. E. C. ruling regarding priority in holding company integration proceedings revived hope that junior securities might be accorded some value in voluntary reorganizations.

Transfers approximated 400,000 shares.

Many customers kept in neutral territory, brokers said, because of more war apprehension resulting from United States seizure of German, Italian and Danish merchant ships in this country. Imminence of a Nazi smash at Yugoslavia also was seen as an argument for speculative conservatism.

PROFIT TAKERS CUT WHEAT RALLY PUSH

CHICAGO, March 31 (P)—Despite a strong rally after mid-session during which wheat prices reached new peaks for the past ten months, the grain market today was beleaguered by profit taking that caused a downward drift of values.

Wheat derives some support from reports of Red Cross flour buying and large British purchases of Canadian wheat but these factors were offset by the urge to accept profits as a result of the recent sharp advance and by evidence of increased redemption of grain under loan. Losses of as much as 2 cents in the corn pit at times helped to unsettle wheat trade. Some of the corn selling may have been associated with purchases of government supplies, traders said.

Wheat closed 1-4 lower than Saturday, May 31 1-4, July 89-90; Corn 1-14 down, May 67-1; July 67-1; Oats 1-4 lower.

WOOL MARKET — BOSTON, March 31 (P) (US Dept. Agr.)—Only scattered inquiries were being received for domestic wools today in the Boston market. A few small lots of greasy combings, quarter-blood bright fleeces wools were sold at mostly 44 to 45 cents in the grease, delivered to mills. Most users were showing little interest in fleeces. Western grown fine and half blood wools shown at feed blocks in the middle west were offered in Boston at around 39 to 40 cents in the grease delivered. The scoured basis cost of these wools was estimated at \$1.03 to \$1.05 delivered, which was more than users were willing to pay for this kind of wool.

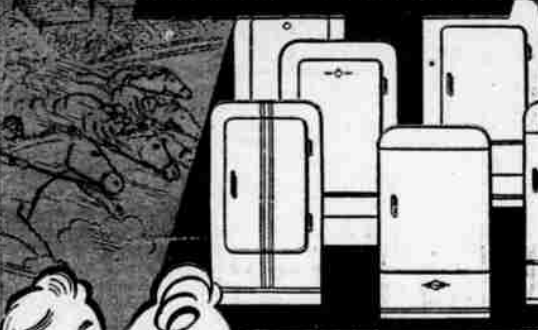
