OFFICERS FOR CHURCH NAMED AT MERRILL

MERRILL—Rev. Lawrence Mitchellmore presided Monday night at the 35th annual meeting of the Merrill Presbyterian church with John W. Taylor presiding during the election of the trustees.

Mrs. Paul Lewis was reelected for a three-year term on the board of deacons, Melvin A. Bowman will serve another five-year term as trustee and Mrs. John W. Taylor was reelected to serve a one-year term as church treasurer. Reports were given for the fiscal year, April 1, 1940 to March 31, 1941.

Receipts for the year totaled \$1894.42 while expenses amounted to \$1908.14. During the year, the church paid all of a \$900 obligation for remodeling the interior and exterior and grounds of the church with the exception of \$60.

Sunday school membership showed a slight increase over the previous year's report of 105, the last report showing 111. Church membership dropped slightly, Rev. Mitchellmore stated, due to two Easter Sundays during the past fiscal year with none as yet recorded for this year. A difference of 11 active memberships was announced, with last year's high placed at 126. Memberships, the pastor stated, usually increase during the Easter season.

In his resume of the year, Rev. Mitchellmore called attention to the success of the annual vacation Bible school last spring when 88 children were enrolled for the two weeks class work.

Wild Pansies Found Near Lakeview

WESTSIDE — Lovers of wild flowers will be interested to know that the tiny wild pansies and other spring wild flowers are blooming on the flat above Muddy creek. The pansies are

so thick in some places that they carpet the ground, particularly on the east side of the road. They will be at their best probably this week and next.

To reach the pansies, turn north off the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway on the road to Cottonwood dam. The first half mile of the regular road is closed because of construction work on the new highway, but a short way west another road turns off and meets the Cottonwood road. The pansy beds are reached just before the road enters the junipers.

Dry Creek Gets New Logging Road

WESTSIDE — A new logging road up Dry creek has been under construction by Buzards of Lakeview for nearly two weeks. It follows in some places the old road up Dry creek canyon. Logs will be taken on it to Lakeview to the Buzard mill. Miss Boutin of Willow ranch recently purchased from Max Schlemmer a right of way for another logging road to be built up Dry creek. Logs coming out on this road will be taken to the mill in Willow ranch, probably by way of a canal across Goose lake.

These two roads up Dry creek will tap large tracts of timber, perhaps as far back in the hills as Yocum valley.

past month. Failing to show up in court following a recent summons Chief of Police Frank G. Roeder took measures to bring the young man, 19, before Judge Coates.

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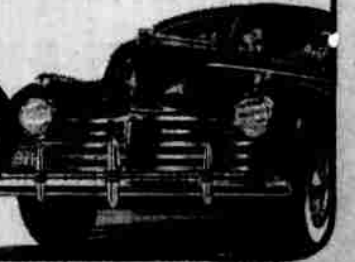
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
