

TRIBESMEN TO RECEIVE PER CAPITA FUNDS

A per capita payment of \$170 will be made to the members of the Klamath Indian tribe on Wednesday, April 9.

Payments will be made at Beatty and Klamath Agency, according to residence of the recipients.

In reporting the forthcoming payment to the members of the tribe, Superintendent Courtwright said that those who have been arrested, jailed and fined since the last per capita payment must see the superintendent before receiving any money.

He urged the Indians to use the per capita money for purchases of supplies and other things that will benefit their families. All children's shares will be deposited to the credit of their individual accounts.

The pay roll closed on March 15, and the agency is authorized to make payments to those who were living on that date, the superintendent announced.

MRS. O. M. HECTOR PASSES THURSDAY

HITLER FORCED TO FIGURE ON MAJOR BATTLE

The way things stand today in the Balkans, if Herr Hitler attacks Yugoslavia it will mean that he finally feels compelled to embark on a major operation instead of the comparatively restricted offensive originally contemplated in an assault on little Greece.

One of the biggest battles the Nazi chief has waged thus far has been to avoid just such a major engagement on the peninsula, since it would be bound to open up a new big war-front against him. Now his hand has been forced.

If and when he strikes at Yugoslavia, it will be with the full knowledge that it will be almost impossible to avoid a general Balkan conflagration. This might become the main land operation of the war, and in any event would compel him to undertake a fresh military task at a moment when he needs all his resources for his blitzkrieg against the British Isles.

Each day adds to the probability that the Yugoslavs will fight to the death to protect their independence. The biggest news since young King Peter took lead of the government that defied Hitler came yesterday in the announcement that Vladimir Macke, leader of the Croat autonomists, had decided to bury the hatchet with Serbs and become vice-premier of the government.

The bitter strife between these two well-nigh irreconcilable groups within Yugoslavia was being exploited by the axis in hopes that the country might be so far divided against itself as to fall. Now that chance has been vastly reduced.

The press campaign in Germany against Yugoslavia is getting hot, and bears all the earmarks of previous propaganda which has been the forerunner of invasion. Still, the Fuehrer's intentions can't be gauged by this.

The press attack is calculated not only to prepare for possible military action but to weaken the morale of the Yugoslavs and bring them to terms without fighting. It doesn't necessarily mean that the Nazis plan to attack immediately or at all, for that matter.

One would expect Hitler to be rushing more troops and equipment to the Balkans if he contemplates this major offensive. He is supposed to have had between 500,000 and 600,000 effectives in Rumania and Bulgaria for the drive against Greece. He needs more than that for the present situation.

Should the Turks decide to come in with the Yugoslavs, the Germans would be up against a combined allied force — Yugoslavs, Turks, Greeks and British—of some five and a quarter million, with large reserves to draw upon. Hitler must figure on that possibility.

The German operations presumably would be conducted on the lines of two possibilities. One would be the throwing back of the Turks and the confining of the conflict to the peninsula. The other would be an all-out smash against the Dardanelles, with the idea of forcing them and driving through the Turks into the near east with its oil and other badly needed supplies.
