(Continued from Page One) jected by negotiators for U. S. Steel's largest subsidiary, Carnegie-Illinois Steel corporation.

Negotiators of the steel union and Carnegie-Illinois will meet again Monday after a weekend adjournment. They have been in session since March 20, considering the union's 9-point program, including a 10-cent an hour wage increase, improved vacations, an "adequate" dues collection system, accelerated grievance machinery, exclusive bargaining rights and other contract improvements.

The Carnegie-Illinois Steel company has either rejected entirely or submitted unsatisfactory counter proposals with respect to each of the points of the SWOC in its program, the notice said.

The union will attempt to arrive at an agreement with the involved companies to provide for necessary maintenance men "during the suspension of operations."

Peaceful picket lines will be established, and "there should be no violence or other unlawful acts on the part of union members, Murray informed local union presidents."

Step by step, Christ handed it. On to the cross He went. There He suffered death and became the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world. For this Christ chose Judas.

Old Law Done Away Sum it up: "When the fullness of the time came, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law." The ten commandments and all the law of Moses that the Jews worshiped, Christ kept to the full. He was the blameless life that rounded out the just demands of the law. He alone merited eternal life. But before taking over the glory, He bowed His holy head and suffered the curse for all who repent of their sin; Jew or Gentile.

From the cross you hear His cry: "It is finished." For fourteen centuries the Hebrews had been under the law. Now the test is ended. From that day to this no man has ever been told by God to keep the ten commandments to earn eternal life. Instead we have a new order. This is God's command to us: "That we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ and love one another as He, Christ, gave us commandment." 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GOEBBELS SAYS GERMANY AIMS AT BRITISH

(Continued from Page One) been transporting vast stores of war supplies from Egypt to Greece.

(Reports, which the British never denied, said that large numbers of British troops, as many as 200,000 according to some estimates, had been moved across the Mediterranean to take up positions in Greece.) The axis powers had considered these convoys of such importance that they sent the Italian navy out in an ill-fated attempt to intercept them—the attempt that ended in the disastrous battle of the Ionian sea.

Official quarters said if radio reports from Berlin were confirmed, Yugoslavia, "in her defense against aggression, like Greece, can count upon the full support of the British empire."

It was recalled that Prime Minister Winston Churchill, on March 27, had promised Yugoslavia would "receive from the British empire and, I doubt not, in its own way, from the United States, all possible aid and support."

"The British empire and its allies will make common cause with Yugoslavia and we will continue to march and strive together until complete victory is won," Churchill said.

NEW YORK, Sunday, April 6 (UP)—Columbia Broadcasting system heard a Berlin radio report early today that the German army was marching against both Greece and Yugoslavia.

A CBS resume of Ribbentrop's announcement, as broadcast by radio Berlin, said: "England has just prepared a new crime against Europe. England has landed troops in the Balkans after Dunkirk and they are attempting to create a new theater of war."

"A blind government has made a pact with Yugoslavia and has offered military aid against the reich. Germany always tried to secure friendly relations with Greece and Yugoslavia but all in vain."

"Hitler has announced that since this morning (Sunday) German troops have been marching against the English to teach them a lesson. This will teach them a lesson."

LONDON, Sunday, April 6 (UP)—Ivan Subotic, Yugoslav minister to London, told the United Press today there was no confirmation from Belgrade up to 9 a. m. that Yugoslavia had been invaded by Germany.

Four Investigations Launched at Scene Of Airline Mishap VERO BEACH, Fla., April 5 (AP)—Four separate investigations of the forced landing Thursday morning of a giant Eastern Air Lines plane in swamp near here during a blinding squall proceeded today as 13 passengers and three crew members appeared on their way to recovery.

The captain, Gerald O'Brien, who insisted on remaining in his wrecked ship until all others were removed, was reported suffering greatly from shock, but a physician said he had not suffered a crushed chest as at first was feared.

Dr. L. H. Martin of Fort Pierce reported Co-Pilot D. M. Crabtree of Miami was the most seriously injured, with a fractured leg, broken cheekbone and head injuries.

Dr. George W. Crile, noted Cleveland surgeon, and Mrs. Crile remained in a hospital with injuries not believed to be serious.

RUSS-JUGOSLAV PACT SIGNED, LONDON SAYS

(Continued from Page One) heard in London, reported early today.

The treaty binds Russia and Yugoslavia for five years to pursue a policy of neutrality and "strictest friendship" in the event one of them is attacked, Moscow radio said.

(Signature of the treaty was reported as the German-Yugoslav crisis appeared headed for an imminent showdown and as Adolf Hitler's newspaper warned Yugoslavia that "the near future will show where this playing with fire leads.")

Signed at Moscow A 3 a. m. radio Moscow news-cast said the treaty was signed in the soviet capital yesterday "after negotiations which have been taking place in Moscow during the past few days."

(Announcement of the treaty came at a time when diplomatic quarters were speculating on what action, if any, Russia would take to forestall a German move in the Balkans.)

The treaty stipulates that Russia and Yugoslavia agree to respect each other's independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity, radio Moscow reported.

Text of the radio Moscow announcement, as heard in London: "The presidium of the supreme soviet of Soviet Russia and his majesty, King Peter, moved by the friendship existing between the two nations

and to satisfy their mutual interest to preserve peace, have decided to conclude a treaty of friendship and non-aggression.

"They appointed for the purpose of concluding such their representatives, V. M. Molotov, representative of the supreme soviet of Soviet Russia, M. Gavrilovitch, V. Silitch and Colonel Savich as representatives of his majesty, King Peter.

"They have agreed to the following: "1. Both sides agreed to refrain from any aggression and to respect each other's independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity.

"2. In case one of them should become a victim of aggression by a third country, the other will keep a policy of friendship towards the first.

"3. The treaty is signed for a period of five years and if not denounced by one of the signatories one year before the end of the treaty, it automatically is prolonged for another five years.

"4. The treaty is in two originals in the Russian and Serbo-Croatian languages, both of which have the power of the original.

Newspaper Reports Extensive Damage By Crazy Inspector BENDIX, N. J., April 5 (AP)—The Passaic Herald-News said in a copyrighted article today that a civilian employee inspector had run amok in the Bendix Aviation corporation plant here, destroying machinery and models valued into the hundreds of thousands of dollars and setting back production of some articles as much as four months.

Neither Bendix officials nor the federal bureau of investigation office at Newark would confirm or deny the story.

The Passaic newspaper said the man ran through the plant of Bendix's pioneer instrument division, swinging in each hand a metal housing which weighed more than ten pounds. One object which the newspaper said had been destroyed was the model for a drift indicator that had taken months to build.

The plant is devoted to precision instruments for aviation, among them parts of the secret bomb sight.

The Herald-News said the inspector launched his attack at the 11:10 lunch hour last night. Stunned at first, employees had to knock him unconscious to subdue him, the newspaper related. He was taken to a psychiatric ward, it added.

The Herald-News said unofficial estimates of the damage ranged as high as \$250,000. He was described as a man of old American stock.

Defense Against Organized Vice Eyed by Army SEATTLE, April 5 (AP)—One phase of the national defense program is to be defense of the army and navy lads from organized vice conditions within luring distance of their posts.

Charles P. Taft, son of the late former president and chief justice, told representatives of numerous groups in the area embracing Fort Lewis and the Puget Sound navy yard meeting here yesterday that federal agencies are "going to go after every law enforcement officer in the areas affected and make them enforce the law"

Taft is an assistant coordinator of health, education, recreation and other related activities under the national defense council.

The highway commissioners, local delegates said, refused to give further consideration to the proposal that at least a section of the Sprague River road be made a secondary state highway. There was talk of construction cost of \$35,000 a mile, a figure the Klamath men regarded as "extremely high." The county road department will proceed with considerable work on the Sprague River road, particularly between the Lakeview highway and Sprague River, it is expected.

The Klamath delegation asked the state commission to oil six miles of graveled sections of Malin-Bonanza road. This was turned down.

British Blast Two German Battleships

(Continued from Page One) at Rotterdam and industrial targets in the Ruhr also were bombed.

The attack on Brest, 49th of the war, was the third since Sunday when the British first reported the presence of the big German battleships in the naz-occupied French port.

"The ships could be clearly identified in the moonlight and the attack was pressed home with great resolution," the air ministry communique said.

"Some of our aircraft bombed from very low levels and good results are reported.

"Sticks of heavy bombs were seen to straddle both ships."

In daylight attacks yesterday, the ministry added, a naval auxiliary was left sinking off the French coast and minesweepers were machine-gunned.

Relays of German bombers attacked the oft-bombed west coast port of Bristol for hours last night and early today in a raid described there as "heavy but not one of our biggest."

Bristol reported only one person killed and two seriously wounded. The British said damage was "nowhere extensive."
