

Knockout of Jugoslavs in North Nearing

Startling

Here is what has occurred in the past 24 hours of the most startling action of the war since the collapse of France:

1 — Germany's mechanized forces have cleared Yugoslavia in two at her 105-mile waistline and reached the Albanian frontier, cutting the British and Greeks off from their Yugoslav allies and threatening Yugoslavia's main army of 1,000,000 or more men in the north with complete encirclement under lightning attacks from every side.

2 — The Jugoslavs, facing peace-meal destruction, smashed into Albania against the Italian army across the Drin river — their only chance now of joining the Greeks — in hopes of knocking out the fascists in a nutcracker Yugoslav-Greek assault before the Germans and Italians can actually join their main forces.

3 — The Germans rammed down into Greece toward the interior after seizing the Aegean port of Salonika — second city of Greece — at 4 a. m. Wednesday, cutting off all of Macedonia and Thracian 200 miles eastward from Salonika to the Turkish frontier and forcing the surrender of "several divisions" of Greek troops in the trap.

4 — Reinforced British air squadrons furiously bombed the Germans in the region of fallen Salonika, supporting Greek warriors who had sworn to make a "do-or-die" stand just westward behind the Vardar river where formidable British forces are understood to be entrenched.

5 — British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, speaking grimly before the house of commons, admitted the gravity of the situation and said that Britain faces actual "disaster" unless the Atlantic sea lanes are kept open to a flood of U. S. war materials, Germany may strike at the British Isles, at Turkey or even at Russia at any moment, he said, but the real test for Britain is in the intensified "battle of the Atlantic."

As Churchill spoke, President Roosevelt in Washington made available to the royal navy 10 coast guard cutters capable of combating submarines and useful in British convoy work.

Nineteen other strikes were in progress at defense plants Wednesday night. There were these developments:

At Washington — Director General William S. Knudsen of the office of production management tells house military affairs committee he favors government power to "commandeer" defense plants pending settlement of labor disputes.

At New York — Southern district soft coal mine owners continue to "balk" at wage-increase agreement between Appalachian district owners and CIO United Mine Workers union which would end work-stoppage of 418,000 soft coal miners; contract covering all but 150,000 miners believed imminent.

At Washington — War department reveals 1,206,603 man-days of production lost through 100 defense strikes between January 1 and April 4.

At Pittsburgh — Two more steel firms grant CIO steel workers' union demand for 10 cents hourly wage boost; negotiations continue between CIO and U. S. Steel corporation, to effect contract covering 250,000 workers before April 15 strike deadline.

At Cleveland — work stoppages by 1220 CIO die casters delays production on aircraft motor parts at American Aluminum company plant.

At San Francisco — Federal mediation plan offered in strike of 1500 AFL machinists at 50 machine shops and foundries holding defense assignments worth \$7,000,000.

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ish Britain's vital forces used for maintaining her trans-Atlantic supply lines, but whether additional armed craft will be transferred to England was not indicated. Britain has said that she is badly in need of ships to escort convoys.

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that ten United States coast guard cutters have been turned over to Britain for the battle of the Atlantic and would soon be operating against German submarines.

He appealed anew for use of Irish ports and airfields to guard Britain's northwestern approaches, and told France she would be strictly blockaded and that British guns would resist any attempt on the part of the Vichy government to transfer the French navy from Africa to metropolitan France where Hitler could use it.

He admitted that "heavy losses" to German planes, submarines and cruisers would cripple British merchant marine disastrously without the "gigantic United States building program" which would give Britain "several million tons" of shipping next year.

If he had his way, he said, he would force Dublin to black out at night or blow it off the face of the earth, for it is responsible for terrific damage in Britain.

The Kennerlys found their son unwilling to talk at length about the fighting in the war. He may return to England, but if the United States would go to war his services would probably be of fered to this country.
