

Tuberculin Tests For Draftees Aim For Health Group

In line with a statement that the United States will have a tuberculosis-free army, a motion passed by the executive board of the Klamath County Public Health association at a meeting Monday evening at the health department makes tuberculin testing of all army draft selectees from Klamath county one of the major projects to be undertaken by the health association this year.

The testing would include chest examinations for positive reactors, it was stated, after the county health officer, Dr. P. H. Rozendal, agreed that he would gladly make the tests.

It was voted that a letter be sent from the association to the county health board demanding why the dental unit at the health department is not being used, although installation has been completed. This action was taken because the health association, along with other civic groups, donated a sum of money to purchase the dental chair and feels that the unit should either be put into operation or the public should be informed as to reasons it is not operating, especially inasmuch as it was installed at the suggestion of the local dental association.

Giving a brief report on the state meeting of the Oregon Tuberculosis association at Portland, R. Paul Roberts, association president, discussed prob-

lems of the future for health associations, including that of migratory workers, the Indian problem where the death rate from tuberculosis is exceedingly high, and educational work among older groups which is believed imperative because half of the tuberculosis deaths in Oregon in 1940 were persons over 50. Roberts said it was emphasized at the meeting that association funds should be concentrated on the eradication of this disease.

Mrs. Nelson Reed of this city, a member of the executive board, was elected to the state board of directors at the Portland meeting, it was announced.

A discussion was held at the Monday meeting of the budget for the coming year. A report from the treasurer, G. C. Blohm, showed slightly more than \$2000 in the treasury, and it was agreed that at least \$500 should be placed in an emergency fund for the upkeep of the x-ray at the health department and for seal sale expenses, and that a larger sum be allotted this year for educational purposes due to the good results obtained by the education chairman, Rev. Eugene V. Haynes, this past year.

A nominating committee appointed to report at the next board meeting consisted of Fred Fleet, G. C. Blohm, Mrs. Burt E. Hawkins and Mrs. T. D. Case.

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WILLKIE, DEWEY PLAN CAMPAIGNS

WASHINGTON, April 9 (P)—Attempts were reported under way Tuesday to effect a working agreement under which Wendell L. Willkie would support Thomas E. Dewey for the republican nomination for governor of New York in 1942 in return for backing by Dewey if Willkie bids for the republican presidential nomination in 1944.

Groundwork for the prospective alliance was said to have been laid in weekend conferences here during which mutual friends of the two were reported to have had "satisfactory conversations" on the matter.

(In New York, Willkie denied the report, saying he had engaged in no such conferences, and had not authorized anyone to engage in any such discussions.)

(District Attorney Dewey, in New York, also said he did not know of such a conference and that he had no political plans.)

Those who have been working to bring about such an arrangement were said to be actuated not alone by interest in the two prospective candidates but in advancing republican chances

generally in the 1942 off-year elections.

They were said to feel that a harmoniously conducted campaign in New York might go a long way toward solidifying the party's ranks elsewhere in its efforts to capture governorships, senatorial places and seats in the house of representatives from the democrats.

Soldiers Salvage Lard From Russian Ship Wreckage

ASTORIA, Ore., April 9 (P)—What beachcombers consider their own unwritten law—thou shalt not hijack—is being violated all over the place since the cargo of the wrecked freighter Vazlav Vorovsky began washing ashore.

There was the case of a Salem, Ore., soldier at nearby Fort Canby. He drove his car along the railroad trestle from the fort to the end of the jetty on Sand Island picking up a carload of 56-pound boxes of lard. There being no turn around, he retraced his route in reverse gear.

At the fort he was promptly slapped into the guardhouse for driving on the trestle, and while he was on the inside somebody hijacked his lard and peddled it for \$1 a case in Ilwaco.

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
