The third passion week service was held Wednesday at noon at the Pelican theatre. The presiding officer was Rev. Cecil C. Brown, pastor of the First Baptist church. The meeting opened with the singing of the hymn, "In the Cross of Christ I Glory." Prayer was offered by Rev. Brown. A vocal solo was rendered by Alden Lewis of Merrill. Rev. Lawrence M. Mitchellmore, pastor of the Merrill Presbyterian church, spoke on the subject, "There Was a Cross."

The Thursday meeting is the last noon-day service. It will begin at 12:25 and close at 12:55 p. m. Rev. Arthur C. Bates, pastor of the First Christian church will be in charge. The special musical number will be given by the First Presbyterian church. Rev. A. Theodore Smith, pastor of the First Presbyterian church will deliver the message of the day centered around the theme, "The Upper Room."

The noon-day passion week services will be climaxed on Good Friday with a three-hour service beginning at 9:55 a. m. It will close at the usual time of 12:55 p. m. The clinics are held with the cooperation of the Klamath Medical society, Dr. T. F. Farley, chairman, and Dr. Peter Rozen, school nurse, of the Klamath County health unit.

Mrs. A. A. Montgomery, assisted by Mrs. Sid Peterson, is chairman of the committee for the clinic. Every effort has been made to contact mothers of children who will enter school for the first time next September. If any mother has not been called she may call the principal of her school or the county health unit and the chairman of her Parent-Teacher unit will see that her child is registered. The clinic is entirely free. The schedule of examinations will be announced later this week.

SALEM, April 9 (AP)—The butter output of the Oregon State college creamery, where butter makers are taught, will be bought at a cent below the market price to supply state institutions, the board of control decided today.

The arrangement was approved by private creamery operators, the board said, because it would enable the creamery to operate without state funds.
