east of Salonika on the coast, were said to be holding out valiantly.

While scattered Greek forces fought a battering ram of German tanks north and east of Salonika, the main Greek army and British "Tommys" spread along a curving new defense line west of the Vardar for a head-on clash with the German blitzkrieg.

The estimate of 1,000,000 Greeks entrapped in eastern Macedonia from Salonika to the Turkish frontier was made by Americans arriving in Athens from the battle-torn area. But it was not disclosed what part of this figure represented Greek soldiers.

Their only remote chance of escape is by sea, it was said by the Americans. They included Paul R. Thorne, American Red Cross representative; Charles House, head of the American farm school at Salonika, and Harry Hill, head of the American Express, who, with his wife, Percidia Capps, was at Alexandroupolis, only 10 miles from the Turkish frontier when the Germans struck at dawn Sunday.

The Greek war communique issued early Friday said: "On the Albanian front there was patrol and artillery activity. Farther east there is nothing to report."

Greenland, he said, has been placed in exactly the same category as any other Atlantic islands owned by non-American powers. The agreement, the secretary asserted, is in complete accordance with terms of the Monroe doctrine and with a declaration signed by the 21 American republics at Havana.

In that latter declaration, the republics agreed that no foreign possession in the western hemisphere should be transferred to the flag of another foreign country.

Referring to Mr. Roosevelt's statement that the United States intended to insure that Greenland would remain a Danish colony after the German invasion of Denmark had ended, Early declared:

"That refers to Greenland or to any of the other possessions, including Canada. It will be defended if attacked."

ATHENS, April 10 (UP)—Greece's great seaport of Salonika was reduced to blazing ruins and its entire harbor works demolished by British army sappers before the city's capitulation to the German blitzkrieg early Wednesday, eye-witness accounts revealed tonight.

LONDON, Friday, April 11 (UP)—German tank columns are driving down Greece's Aegean coast from captured Salonika upon the right flank of the main Greek army and the British expeditionary force at historic Mount Olympus, an Ankara radio broadcast said early today.

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tion of any proposed settlement the company would insist that certain complaints filed with the national labor relations board here by the union and "other national labor relations board hearings affecting the Rouge plant be deferred and held in abeyance," until after the election which the NLRB has ordered to be held in the Rouge plant within 45 days.

Bennett, concluding his letter, told the governor:

"As to the third point in your proposal, the company is not only willing but anxious to expedite the holding of an election. The company's sole interest in that regard is to make sure that a fair and honest election is held—an election that will represent the true wishes of the majority of its employees. In that connection, the company will make its payroll available at any time in the plant."

Bennett said that the company had been anxious to settle the strike as speedily as possible for the sake of its employees and families "who are innocent victims" and because of the "urgency of completing its national defense contracts."

He added that the company did not wish to appear "arbitrary" in effecting a temporary solution of the strike.

The governor, in the presence of union officials, read a letter of reply to him from R. J. Thomas, union president, which said the UAW-CIO accepted the proposal and would recommend its adoption at a meeting tonight of Ford Rouge plant workers.

The letter said in part: "We have come to the conclusion that your proposal constitutes a constructive basis for termination of the strike and would create for maintenance of stable and equitable labor relations in the plant pending holding of the national labor relations board's election."

"Our decision has been influenced also by the desire of the CIO, the UAW-CIO and the Ford workers to expedite our national defense program."

"We accordingly accept your proposal and will recommend its adoption to a meeting of Rouge workers tonight."

The letter was signed by Thomas, Allan S. Haywood, CIO national organization director, and Michael F. Widman, Jr., director of the UAW-Ford organizing committee.

The high command said British troops in Libya were "unsuccessfully attempting to escape encirclement by Italian and German forces beyond Derna."

Italian planes were said to have set big fires and attacked British ships at Tobruk, the next main objective in the axis eastward drive from Derna.

The high command admitted that enemy planes had bombed Zara, the Italian naval base on the east coast of the Adriatic, and that some damage was done.

"powerful high explosive bombs" in the center of Berlin last night and started large fires, the air ministry announced today.

Overnight attacks also were made on an aluminum plant in German-occupied Norway and a radio station in Denmark, the British declared.

Planes Shot Down

They acknowledged the loss of eight planes in these operations and in daylight assaults yesterday on Brest and other targets, but declared that 11 German bombers were downed in heavy attacks last night on the English midlands and northeast.

It was the first British raid on Berlin since March 23. An informed source said that while the attack was not comparable in size with Monday's night assault on Kiel, "it would have been felt."

Smaller forces of British night raiders were said to have struck at Emden and Vegesack, near Hanover.

The 11 Nazi bombers reported shot down in moonlight last night brought to 23 the number destroyed in the last three nights, the British declared.
