

KENNEL CLUB EYES SCHOOL HUMANE STUDY

A board meeting of the Klamath Kennel Club and Humane society was held Thursday evening at the offices of the vice president, Mrs. M. J. Young. Others in attendance included S. W. Percy, president; Mrs. Ida M. Odell, Mrs. E. O'Brien, and Councilmen Rollin Cantrall and A. H. Bussman, who were invited to attend the meeting.

Attention of the board was directed to the state law which provides that not less than 15 minutes a week in humane instruction shall be given in all grades of the public schools of Oregon, from the first to the eighth inclusive, and steps are being taken by the local society to ascertain the cost of recommended texts for this instruction. Mrs. Isabelle Blixner of the county schools and J. Percy Wells, city school superintendent, have promised full cooperation in the execution of this law.

At the request of Mrs. Young, it was voted to have the books audited for the past year. A gratifying increase in revenue from the kennels and number of animals boarded was reported for the months of February and March in comparison to the same months of 1940. Through effort of Klamath's members in the legislature, Representatives Henry Semon and Harry Boivin, and Senator Marshall Cornett, an allocation of state funds for humane work will in the future be diverted to Klamath county, instead of all of it going to the region west of the Cascades as in the past. It was stated that while this fund is small, it will help materially in providing care for injured animals.

Plans were made for a dog show early in the summer which, with the Mutt show sponsored each autumn by A. H.
