

# Concert Drive To Start April 14th

### Paul Robeson, Famous Negro Singer, Scheduled As First Artist To Appear in Klamath Falls

This coming week is going to be a busy one for the men and women who work on the membership drive for the Klamath Community Concert association, but considering the sensational year of music which members have recently enjoyed, the drive will probably go over in fine fashion.

Workers will meet at half past six o'clock at the Willard hotel to outline plans for the drive with President George A. Myers presiding. First artist to appear on the 1941-42 series is Paul Robeson, outstanding negro singer and artist and known internationally as the greatest folk singer in the world today. Robeson will appear during late fall if it is understood. He is the only artist chosen thus far, but others will be on a par with him.

Those who have not belonged to the association in the past—and membership is open to all persons, young or old—may ask themselves a few questions President Myers has submitted the following questions and answers which are of interest:

Why do we have a Community Concerts Association in our city?

To afford the opportunity, right here in our community, of hearing the great music of the world, performed by the most distinguished concert artists.

Why isn't the artist series announced in advance?

Our committee does not know how much money will be available to spend until all annual membership dues are paid during the campaign week. There are no "backers" or "financial angels" behind our Association.

What do I get for my membership dues?

As a member you are entitled to admission to all the concerts presented by the Association at no additional cost. A minimum of three concerts are presented each season, and as many more as the size of the membership makes possible.

Are single admissions sold for any one concert?

No! Admission to the concerts is by season membership card only.

When and how do I join?

You may join by sending in your dues to the secretary upon receipt of this announcement; or join through one of the volunteer workers; or come to the campaign headquarters during membership week. No memberships are available after the campaign closes, nor will admissions be sold at the door.

What type of artists are presented on our annual series?

Our local artist committee selects the artists series from a list of the most outstanding personalities and attractions in the musical world.

What is the scope of this plan of concert presentation?

Over 350 cities and towns in the United States and Canada are currently enjoying the best in musical entertainment through the Community Concert Association Plan.

Is our organization a local one?

Yes! It is entirely local. Our executive committee plans the annual campaign, collects the dues, deposits all money in a local bank, and our artist committee selects the attractions to be presented.

Does our association operate on a non-profit basis?

Yes! All money collected is used for engaging the artists and paying the local expenses of presenting these artists in concert.

Are membership cards transferable?

Yes. Members may secure as many memberships as they desire and give or lend these cards to others as they wish.
