Home Damaged by Fire at Tionesta

TIONESTA — Fire last night destroyed the interior and furniture in the home of Mrs. Edna Buck.

The fire alarm was sounded a few minutes before midnight but precious minutes were lost while men circled their cars around over camp trying to locate the fire. There was no blaze to guide them because the flames were smothered down when Mrs. Buck ran out of the house to summon help, closing the door behind her, thereby shutting off any draft to fan the blaze.

Fire equipment arrived before the flames could burn through the walls and the fire was soon out, but not in time to save any of the furnishings, which are a total loss.

Everything was covered by insurance, however, and with the adjustment from the company Mrs. Buck expects to be able to replace most of the things lost. Cause of the fire was not determined.

NLRB in Recess On Ward Hearing

PORTLAND, April 15 (AP) — A national labor relations board hearing of unfair labor practice charges against the Montgomery Ward & Company store recessed today until Wednesday after an AFL witness had presented labor's side of the controversy.

Jack Estabrook, Warehousemen's union secretary, told Examiner George Bokart, Washington, D. C. yesterday that Ward's had failed to sign a contract despite NLRB certification of the union as bargaining representative in August, 1940.

He said Ward's labor relations counsel, W. P. Prwell, Oakland, Calif., had asserted the company "did not want to sign

any sort of agreement that would force employees into the union." The union did not demand a closed shop, but wanted some sort of union preference in hiring and higher wages, he added. A strike has been conducted against the Portland store by the Warehousemen, Retail Clerks and Office Employees since Dec. 7, 1940, and has resulted in picketing of all Ward's stores in Oregon. A similar strike resulted in closure of the Oakland, Calif., store.

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PAYROLL ZOOMING
SANTA MONICA, Calif., April 15 (AP)—Douglas Aircraft corp., has 28,295 persons on its payroll and is hiring others at a rate of \$50 a week. A company report said employment will reach 55,000 with completion of expansion of the Santa Monica and El Segundo plants, and of new plants at Long Beach and Tulsa, Okla.
