STOCK MARKET CONTINUES ON TREND LOWER

NEW YORK, April 16 (AP)—The retreat of the stock market since the opening of the Balkan fighting was extended today on an irregular front, dropping a number of important shares to the lowest prices seen this year.

Down fractions to more than a point most of the day were Douglas Aircraft, Du Pont, Eastman, General Electric, Union Carbide, Sears Roebuck, Westinghouse and J. I. Case.

Notable among gainers were Crucible Steel, United States Steel, Atlantic Coast Line, Western Union, Santa Fe, Phelps Dodge and Glenn Martin.

Transactions approximated 800,000 shares.

Corporate bonds were uneven.

TEAMSTERS GIVEN INCREASED WAGES

A wage increase of approximately 50 cents a day for transfer company pickup and delivery men in Klamath Falls was announced Tuesday by Earl K. Edsall of the AFL teamsters union who at the same time revealed that negotiations were underway for a pay boost averaging 50 cents for truck drivers and warehousemen handling local grocery products.

The transfer employees' increase brings their scale in line with prevailing scales in other sections of the state Edsall said. The best benefits employees of the Bend-Portland lines, Consolidated Freightways, O. K. Transfer and City Transfer.

Negotiating with the union on the grocery situation are Pacific Fruit Express, Mason-Ehrman and Western States.

WHEAT BIDS STEADY AFTER NERVOUSNESS

CHICAGO, April 16 (AP)—After swinging nervously over a wide range most of the session, showing a loss of more than a cent at one time, wheat prices steadied today and closed with little net change from yesterday.

Late buying that helped the market's recovery was attributed to previous short sellers and milling interests, possibly reflecting some flour sales to government agencies. Selling was induced by food grain belt rains, uncertainty about the wheat loan program and war news.

Wheat closed 1/8 cent lower to 1/16 higher compared with yesterday's finish, May 91c, July 90 1/2c, corn 1-1/8c higher, May 68 1/2c, July 59c; oats 1/8c lower to 1/16 higher.

Early shorn 12-months Texas wools were sold at \$1.05, scoured basis, while asking prices on contracted good 12-month wools ranged \$1.07 to \$1.10, scoured basis. Inquiries were being received on fine and half blood foreign wools but sales were very slow.
