

PLANS READY FOR 4-H CLUB SPRING FAIR

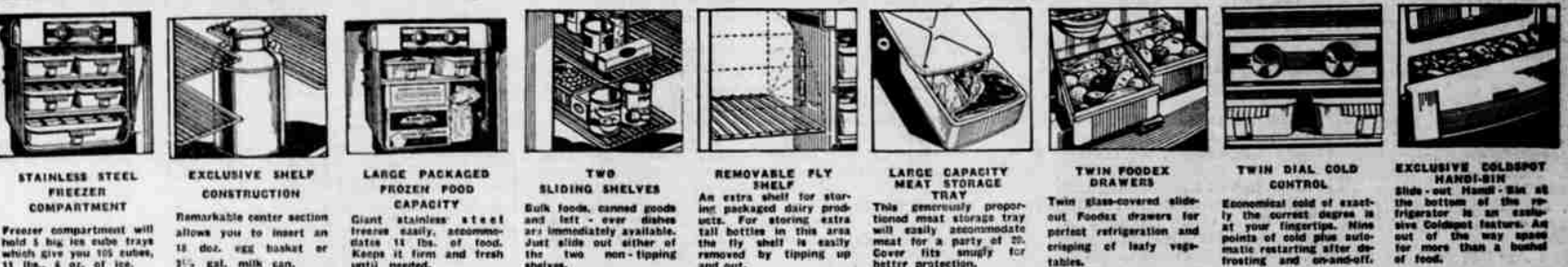
