Dies Candidate for Sheppard's Seat

ORANGE, Tex., April 17 (AP) Rep. Martin Dies, (D-Tex.), outspoken chairman of the house committee investigating un-Americanism today formally announced his candidacy for the senate to fill the vacancy created by the death of veteran Morris Sheppard.

Ardent foe of communism and nazism whose investigations have dug into communities from coast to coast, Dies has long been regarded as a possible senatorial candidate in Texas. His announcement was the second one for the special election which must be held before July 9.

First to announce was Texas' 33-year old Attorney General Gerald C. Mann, former Southern Methodist university football star. Names of a dozen other political figures, including Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, have been mentioned also as possible candidates.

CONCERT DRIVE RESPONSE HERE REPORTED GOOD

First concert of the coming season will be that presented by Paul Robeson, who has proved to be one of the largest drawing cards in the concert world since his return from successful appearances in Europe.

Robeson is called the greatest interpreter of negro spirituals in the world today and Klamath Falls music lovers are extremely gratified that he has been scheduled for an early appearance here. With utmost simplicity Robeson presents his music as it has never been presented before. Blessed with a natural gift of song, he is moved by the fundamental spirit of the music of his race, full of the passionate feeling which inspired the unknown composers of these immortal melodies.

Not only is Robeson known in the music world, but he was first acclaimed as a football hero while at Rutgers university where he gained his letter in four sports and a Phi Beta Kappa key in his junior year. He was picked as an All-American end by sports writers the same year. He studied law at Columbia university but turned to the theatre to make a brilliant debut in Eugene O'Neill's, "Emperor Jones." His success as an actor was instantaneous and he appeared thereafter in "All God's Chillun," "Porgy," "Black Boy," and "Show Boat."

Here's how TO TAKE SPOTS OFF FURNITURE

GRAB SPOTS on upholstery fabrics (caused by contact of head and hands) can be brushed off with a cleaning fluid.

Carbon tetrachloride (sold at drug stores) is recommended because it is not inflammable. Benzine and similar solvents are dangerous to use in a closed room—may ignite from friction.

Inflammable solvents can be used for dry cleaning upholstery that is not fast color—but because of the quantity needed the work is best done outdoors. The solvent is applied with a soft brush, beginning at the top and working down. (Take care to protect the woodwork from the solvent which might injure the finish.) Always test a cleaner on some obscure part of the article before making a general application.
