Employees of the Sears store in this city were today informed that they will participate in the contribution of the company to the savings and profit sharing pension fund of Sears, Roebuck and company employees which amounts to \$4,136,129 for the fiscal year 1940.

This sum represents the largest contribution ever made by Sears in the 25 years of the fund's existence. It includes five per cent of the company's 1940 net profits before taxes as well as a special contribution of \$1,000,000.

As explained by Manager T. R. Thompson, a regular employee of the company becomes eligible for fund membership after a year of service. He then is given the right to deposit five per cent of his salary in the fund. No employee may deposit more than \$250 a year, however. Each year, Sears, Roebuck and company contributes a sum equal to five per cent of its net profit. The combined amount is invested, from time to time, in Sears stock.

"The attractiveness of the plan is attested by the fact that over 95 per cent of eligible employees are members of the fund," said Thompson.

In addition, during 1940, Sears paid out \$4,594,652 for such legally imposed employee benefits as workmen's compensation insurance, unemployment compensation taxes and federal old age benefit taxes. This figure represents an increase of \$836,172 over 1939.

Hearing Slated on Ring Rot Control Area in Oregon

SALEM, April 18 (AP)—Hearings to determine whether Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties should be set up as control areas against potato ring rot disease will be held next Tuesday in the courthouses of those counties, the state department of agriculture said today.

If the control area is established, those counties would be closed to all new potatoes from outside. Potato growers have requested the action as protection against bacterial ring rot, central Oregon and a small Nevada district being the only western producing areas free of the disease, the department said.

COUNTY SELLS BRAYMILL SITE NEAR CHILOQUIN

County court members Friday announced the sale of the Braymill White Pine real properties on Sprague river near Chiloquin to Christina Brown of Chiloquin for \$3750 cash.

The county had foreclosed upon the property because of non-payment of approximately \$11,000 in taxes.

William Bray of the Braymill White Pine company, court members said, retained possession of all personal property, such as machinery and motors, located at the lumber plant which had not operated for many years.

The county's foreclosure covered real property only. A total of 160 acres was included in the property taken by the county for taxes.

Court members said they had other offers for the real property but all involved removal of the personal property which did not belong to the county.

The court said that a question had arisen as to whether certain piping on the property was real or personal because it had been assessed as personal property, whereas such piping is usually considered real property.

LIVESTOCK BAN TO CONTROL PEST SET

SALEM, April 18 (AP)—Seeking to prevent spread of screw worm infestation to Oregon animals, the state department of agriculture issued an order today preventing shipment of livestock into Oregon from infested areas, unless animals from such areas can be certified as free from the screw worm maggot.

Under the order, effective April 25, cattle, sheep, horses, mules and asses from California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Mexico will be barred unless they have the certificates.

The department advised Oregon livestock men that the ban would prevent spread of the pest. The northernmost point where screw worm has been reported is Redding, Calif.

The screw worm, a greenish fly which lays eggs in any break in the skin, destroys several million dollars worth of livestock annually in the south and southwest, the department said.
