

Prominent Portland Pianist to Appear

Henri Arcand Scheduled for Concert Before Klamath Falls Woman's Library Club Monday

Another outstanding event in this season's musical privileges, is the coming to Klamath Falls of Henri Arcand, artist-pianist, who will appear next Monday afternoon, April twenty-first at the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club. Mr. Arcand has made many successful appearances as soloist in this state. He has been guest-artist with the Portland Symphony orchestra, the Vancouver Symphony, the Federal Symphony, the Portland Ballet. He was one of ten guest artists chosen to appear with the Portland Symphony in its Silver Jubilee season.

Mr. Arcand gives piano recitals every season, and also plays over the radio. A Portland critic says: "Both in concert and radio Mr. Arcand's playing is characterized by a maturity of musical sense and a brilliance of execution. His repertoire includes the best in classical literature as well as the ultra modern. His musical flair for the music of the moderns has won wide commendation and interest."

The outstanding number on next Monday's program will be the MacDowell Sonata Eroica. MacDowell is acknowledged to be our greatest American composer, and the concerto is a test of technical skill and interpretation. The Sonatine Transatlantique by Tansman, with Fox Trot, Charleston, and Blues, should be most interesting. In fact, every number on the program beginning with the ever popular Debussy, is full of interest.

To add to the novelty of hearing these moderns interpreted by an artist, Mr. Arcand gives a talk or lecture, which makes each composition appeal to the understanding of his audience. Mr. Arcand has had the distinction of presenting many of these modern works in Portland for the first time. He has a wide and discriminating knowledge of composers and their work, and in addition, demonstrates the great versatility of his artistic ability. His program follows:

Scout Council Has Annual Meet

Officers Elected, Chairmen Appointed for Ensuing Year; Reports Show Gains

Officers for the ensuing year were elected at the annual meeting of the Girl Scout council held Thursday evening, April the seventeenth, with Mrs. H. A. Dresie re-elected as commissioner, an office she has capably filled this past year during which scouting gained appreciably.

Others elected to council positions were Miss Hazel Morrison, first deputy commissioner; Mrs. W. E. Lamm, second deputy commissioner; Mrs. J. K. Reno, secretary; Mrs. C. C. Kelley, treasurer, and Mrs. George Sample, recorder.

Annual reports showed more than a fifty per cent gain in Girl Scout memberships. In April, 1940, there were seventeen troops in the Klamath area, and at the same time this year, the number had increased to twenty-two. A year ago there were sixty-six Brownies, a hundred and seventy-nine intermediate scouts and twenty senior scouts. At present there are a hundred and forty-nine Brownies registered, two hundred and eight intermediates and forty-five senior scouts. Over a hundred adults are working as leaders, assistant leaders and members of the council.

Last summer sixty-four girls attended the two weeks' camp at Lake O' the Woods, and it is hoped this year that the gain will be in proportion to the rest of the program. Mrs. Calvin Peyton is in charge of camp registration.
