

Soroptimists Hear Senator on Thursday

Marshall Cornett Addresses Women's Organization on Activities of Recent Legislature

With State Senator Marshall Cornett as guest speaker, the Soroptimist club received a concise, first-hand account of the 1941 Oregon legislature at its Thursday noon luncheon at the Willard hotel, of which possibly the most interesting part to Klamath residents was the story behind the failure of passage of the reapportionment of the 17th senatorial district bill.

Mrs. Alice Howard, legislative chairman of the club, introduced the speaker.

"During my campaign for state senator I made only one specific promise," the speaker stated. "That was that I would introduce and support a measure to reapportion the 17th district in order that we might have representation comparable to other districts of the state, and to better the inequitable condition that now exists."

"On February the twelfth, I introduced Senate Bill 241 which proposed to transfer the 19th district, which overlaps Morrow, Umatilla and Union counties, and make of Deschutes, Lake, Jefferson and Crook counties the 19th district, with a population of 32,499, leaving Klamath county, with a population of 40,497 the 17th senatorial district."

"When the bill came up for final passage on February the twenty-fourth, after I had previously made a motion that it be made a special order of business on that date, the opposition was led by Senators Mahoney and Kenlin of Multnomah. There had also been some vote swapping. Senator Wheeler of Lane county, who had voted in favor of the bill in committee, changed and voted against it."

"The merits and fairness of the bill were not considered by the opposition but was rather placed on a personal, sentimental and emotional basis with the theme song that we were trying to vote Rex Ellis out of a job. Ellis made an impassioned speech, never referring to the merits of the measure but continually harping on how much he enjoyed the fellowship displayed in the senate, how he enjoyed the social life and that his wife would be broken-hearted if she was unable to come back two years hence, and stated that he closed with a prayer in his heart that the senators would not vote him out of his position. Near in mind that his term expires before the next session and that he also has aspirations to be the representative in congress from this district."

"In my opinion the debate on the senate floor had no bearing whatever on the final outcome but that the measure was defeated by vote trading before the bill came up for final passage."

Senator Cornett then recounted other measures to which he and Representative Henry Semon, working closely together, resorted in an effort to secure the representation to which Klamath is entitled. He stated that it is his hope that public opinion has been so focused that during the next session he will be able to institute and consummate a similar measure.

Regarding other bills, Senator Cornett said that he supported the bill increasing lengths and load limits on trucks because he felt that inasmuch as Klamath is so near the California line it would give the county's agricultural interests, as well as others, an economic advantage. And just to show how inconsistent and unpredictable ninety men can be, he said that the legislature, after rejecting the original bill, turned around and passed a senate bill authorizing lengths of trucks be increased to sixty feet, and a house bill allowing the logging industry to increase loads which, together, accomplished exactly what was provided in the original bill, with the exception that it applied only to logging trucks. The senator felt that this was class legislation.

"The so-called speed bill passed and becomes a law because it was introduced and sponsored disguised as a 'safety measure,'" he stated. "In my opinion it is a step backwards and is open for unlimited abuse. It sets a maximum speed of fifty-five miles an hour at the discretion of the speed control board which is to be appointed, adding another board to our already board and commission-infested state."

"The real danger in this bill, however, is the prima facie portion from which the law gets its name. This act transfers the burden of proof from the arresting officer to the offender, whereas it has been a foregone conclusion for ages, in the democratic form of government, that a person is innocent until proven guilty."

Senator Cornett also explained the confusion and

mistake in the cigarette tax bill that was rushed through at the close of the session and is due to become a law unless referendum is instituted. He said that he did not support this bill for the simple reason that he was informed by legal talent that the measure, because of its defective title, would be declared unconstitutional by the courts.

"It is inconceivable," he stated, in closing his talk, "that even in sixty or ninety days every other year these ninety unorganized men could be expected to segregate the good from the bad, and the constitutional forty days would not afford ample time for statesmen of the calibre of Jefferson, Clay, Jackson or Lincoln, men whose strength of character, spiritual and moral fiber left to us so rich a heritage, to give mature thought or just consideration to nearly a thousand bills which vitally affect the welfare of more than a million people."

"Just what steps are necessary to amend our constitution to meet present day needs I am not qualified to answer. But if remedial measures are not inaugurated and consummated our democratic and American form of government will be wrested from us and we will be ruled by a government of overlapping boards, bureaus and commissions. It is high time, in the face of chaotic world conditions, and the ever growing effort to centralize government, that we, as citizens of Oregon, give sober thought to our state government and make a unified effort to maintain our state rights."

Crisis Appears Near In Boeing Drive by CIO Union Group

SEATTLE, April 19 (AP)—A crisis apparently was approaching today in the Congress of Industrial Organizations' sudden move to "organize" the big Boeing Aircraft factory here following suspension of the faction torn Aeronautical Federation of Labor Aeronautical Mechanics union.

Hugo A. Lundquist, suspended business agent of the AFL local, was looking for another hall after Mayor Earl Millikin denied him use of the civic auditorium for a mass meeting tomorrow to hear national leaders in the CIO. Prosecutor B. Gray Warner, after a five-hour conference with the mayor and peace officers, issued a press statement that "communistic elements in both the AFL and CIO have joined together at this time... for the purpose of disrupting or slowing down the aircraft industry so vital and important to the national defense."

He said county and municipal officials had agreed on a program "to insure the safety of the people of this community and the protection of its defense industries... should purported picket lines, or any other move be attempted at Boeing's for the purpose of intimidating the workers by third parties..." Mayor Millikin said he ordered Lundquist's auditorium lease cancelled after ascertaining the purpose of the meeting had been misrepresented.

Medford Pastor Elected Moderator Of Presbytery

GRANTS PASS, April 19 (AP) Rev. Sherman L. Divine of Medford was elected moderator of the presbytery of southwest Oregon at its spring meeting here which was scheduled to conclude a two-day session Friday. Forty ministers and elders attended from California and Oregon.

Dr. Divine's election occurred on the 41st anniversary of his ordination at Holly, Mich.

Tips From Garden Notebook

There is usually room in any garden plot for a few berry plants. And those without them do not realize what they are missing, for there is nothing more delicious than berries freshly picked. Growing them for ones self will also enable a person to grow a better quality than can be sold in the markets. For the market grower must raise the kind that will stay fresh in appearance for many days, retain its shape and be of a more meaty variety that will not bruise easily, therefore one that will not be so juicy as those that can be picked and eaten at once. I think anyone who has eaten the soft, juicy kind fresh from the garden will agree with me on this point. Naturally though this type of strawberry is not quite as hardy growing in this section as the other kind.

However the kind most commonly grown here, the everbearing, can be brought to a state of perfection through careful cultivation. The one season berry does not do so well here unless they can be grown in a very sheltered spot in which frost will not hit. I think most of us who have grown the June bearing type have discovered that just about the time that they are well bloomed out and berries ready to set on the vine, a hard frost comes along and shortly after we will notice that the center of the bloom has turned black instead of a tiny green berry forming. This is what the frost has done, blighted the blossom just enough to prevent the berry from forming.

Most of us who have tried different varieties, find it's better to stick to the everbearing kind because they will soon bloom again and produce another and better crop, and will do this successively throughout the season. The quality of berry even of this type will depend a great deal on the method chosen to grow them. I believe the most common method used is the single row. That is setting the plants about a foot apart in rows about two feet wide and letting the runners fill up the spaces in the rows. This is known as the "single hedge row." If the runners are allowed to form a wide row, that is several plants deep, it is known as the "multiple hedge row." Then another method and the one productive of large, but fewer berries is the hill system, that is, setting the plants in hills about two feet or more distance each way. The runners must be kept well cut off so that all the strength will go to the parent plant to produce large berries. The single row system produces more berries but smaller in size, and the matted row in turn will have more but still smaller berries.

Strawberries do not do well on newly dug or plowed ground, for new ground will probably contain enough white grubs and wireworms to destroy the berry roots. Sod should be turned under a year or two and manure used that much ahead of time, so that when the ground is turned under again the weed seed will be lost through tillage, thereby lessening the weeding job later on.

Very often, with the best of care we fail to get a crop of berries, due probably to the fact that we have gotten a variety of berry with imperfect flowers (in which the stamens are defective or lacking). These will bear no fruit unless pollinated from the perfect varieties.
