13 COUNTIES MISS TRAFFIC DEATHS

Thirteen of Oregon's 36 counties and 31 of the principal towns and cities of the state had no traffic fatalities during the first quarter of 1941, according to statistics compiled by the traffic safety division of the state department.

The counties which had a clean record so far as traffic deaths were concerned, were Grant, Lake, Wheeler, Jefferson, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Hood River, Polk, Lincoln, Curry and Josephine.

Cities with a clean record for the first three months were as follows: La Grande, Grants Pass, Corvallis, Roseburg, Marshfield, Tillamook, Ashland, Newport, Lakeview, Ontario, Burns, Heppner, Enterprise, Silverton, Dallas, Newberg, West Linn, Myrtle Point, Reedsport, Milton-Freewater, Salem.

Of the cities with a clear record, the following were winners

in the 1940 traffic safety contest conducted by the secretary of state: Salem, Reedsport, Myrtle Point, West Linn, Dallas, Heppner, Ontario, North Bend, McMinnville, Marshfield and Corvallis.

No Question of Keeping Busy in Army, Says Report

Just what are those selective service men doing in the army? This is perhaps one of the most frequently asked questions in the United States today. If anyone stopped to ask one of the army's "trainees" this question, he would probably not falter one bit when he answered, "We keep busy." And they do, according to reports.

Dispatches from Camp Roberts, infantry replacement center, reveal that Private Paul Welch of this city is among 976 selective service trainees who "keep busy" in the 7th

infantry training battalion at that post in California. At present there are eight such infantry battalions at Camp Roberts, which is situated inland from the Pacific coast about 20 miles, and approximately midway between the metropolitan centers of San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Each trainee spends a busy day at the camp and the roster on the farm has nothing on the camp buglers—men who never fail. Each morning except Sunday, they're up and waiting im-

patiently for 5:40 to come around so they can noisily awaken the draft army with the brassy notes of "first call."

Duties of Public Health Nurse Shown in Review of Typical Day

Queries often received by the county health officer as to what the public health nurses do, what are their duties, resulted in this article, "A Day With the Public Health Nurse," as the most concise method of outlining their work.

The nurses whose headquarters are at the health department have a generalized program, and visit all sections of the county, each nurse having charge of a definite territory and making regular reports to the county health officer.

The following are all in the day's work:

After leaving the health offices about 8 a. m., the nurse's first call, made at the request of a private physician, was to check

the weight, feeding and care of a three-month-old infant. The second call was to a crippled child of a year-and-a-half, referred to the nurse by a private physician, and application was made for crippled child services.

The next call was to investigate a report by the juvenile officer that a baby was ill and being grossly neglected, and there the nurse found that the young mother had already planned to take the child to the family physician. This was followed by a post-natal call and then a prenatal call at the request of the doctor to a home in the country, in order to plan for a home delivery of the baby.

After this there was a routine checkup by the nurse of a tuber-
