MacMitchell Leads NYU To Penn Win

PHILADELPHIA, April 28 (U.P.)—Little Leslie MacMitchell, a lithe, dark-haired lad who learned his running on the sidewalks of New York ran his heart out on Franklin Field Saturday to lead New York University to the 47th annual Penn relay championship over a group of speed kings from Indiana.

His breath-taking mile as anchor man on the four-mile relay team gave the Violets their third relay victory and the triumph necessary to win the mythical title—decided on the basis of relay races alone.

But there was a blue ribbon for Indiana, too, for the Big Ten champions took two relay crowns and two individual events during the two-day meet.

North Texas State Teachers made the only successful title defense when its four fast sprinters combined for a 1.27 mark in the 880 relay.

Open Season on Elk, Sealions Eyed on Coast

WALDPORT, April 28 (AP)—The state game commission advised the South Lincoln Rod and Gun club today that it was considering an open season on sealions and elk in this area.

The commission reported a survey was being made of elk herds in southern Lincoln and northern Lane counties and if an excess of animals was found the season would be opened.

In answering protests that sealions were seriously damaging both commercial and sport fishing by eating large numbers of salmon and other fish as they enter coastal waters, commissioners said they were without authority to remove protection from sealions before June 15, but planned to do so after that date.

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Satra's Two Hits Pace Klamath Team

New State Leaguers Score Eight Runs in First Three Innings

Scoring eight runs in the first three innings on seven walks, three hits and two errors, Klamath's State league Pelicans went on to take a 9-6 decision from Medford's Southern Oregon league entry, the Rogues, Sunday afternoon at Recreation park in the initial practice tilt of the 1941 baseball season.

It remained for Manager Paul "Hoosier" Hoffard of the invaders, however, to provide the thrill of the day for 300 partisan fans when he poled out a four-run 350-foot homer over the right-centerfield fence in the third frame to tie up the score at 5-5. The veteran Medford outfielder, said to be better than 50 years of age, sent the second pitch offered him by Pitcher George Burdick of the Pelicans sailing on its way to clear the 10-foot barrier by about five feet. Teammates Gitzzen, Hoffman and Dick Lewis were on the base paths at the time.

Brooklyn Climbs Up

Wyatt Appears Headed For Record; Reds Lose

Whitlow Wyatt, whose baseball pitching career includes 11 years of service in the major leagues appears headed for the best record of his career, in his third season with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The tall, partially-bald right hander pitched and batted Brooklyn into first place in the National league Monday with a 3-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds in the Dodgers' first meeting with league's top pennant contenders. The victory ran Brooklyn's winning streak to seven in a row and was the 11 in 12 games.

Fanned 10
Wyatt, in winning his third straight game, fanned 10 and held the Reds to six hits, one a homer by Frank McCormick. He has now yielded only 13 hits in 27 innings or slightly less than one every two innings. He came through with the game-winning single in the ninth after Jimmy Wadell had singled, advanced on an infield out and Mickey Owen was purposely passed.

Wyatt won 15 games with the Dodgers last season.
No other games were scheduled in the National league.
In the only two American league games scheduled, the Cleveland Indians racked up a 7-2 triumph over the Detroit Tigers while the Chicago White Sox trimmed the St. Louis Browns, 2-1.

Al Milnar outpitched young Hal Newhouse, allowing the Tigers only six scattered hits. Newhouse gave up four hits in six innings but walked nine.

The White Sox scored the winning run in the sixth on a walk to Jack Rosenthal and singles by Mike Kreevich and Mike Tresh.

20-30 Plans Pushed for Track Meet

Big Tourney Scheduled For Friday; Locals Take Three Places at Alturas

Activity Monday was thrown into sudden high gear for this weekend's big 20-30 track meet at Klamath high's Modoc field.

The tourney, which stands out as the only cinder competition in the city this spring attracting outside schools, will be held Friday night. Preliminaries are scheduled for Friday afternoon.

The local 20-30 club, which decided to stage the tourney when plans for the annual Lions' club meet fell through, promises a colorful show program to support track and field events.

Opening the card will be an Olympic-style parade with all athletes marching on the field behind the Klamath high band. Awards will be presented by a queen and four princesses chosen from the high school student body.

Prizes will be in the shape of a trophy to each individual winner, a medal to second place men, and ribbons to third, fourth and fifth place winners. A huge team trophy will go to the title-winning school.

Thus far entered in the meet are most southern Oregon schools and a great many from northern California. Probably the most outstanding performer will be Medford's "Racin' Ray" Johnson, an ace quarter-mile who has been threatening the national 440 mark.

ALTURAS, April 28 (Special)
Four records were shattered in the high school annual relay races held here Saturday. This was the twelfth annual track event sponsored by the 20-30 club of Alturas to which all schools in southern Oregon and northern California are invited to compete.

Smelter of Adin ran the 880 in 2:15.9, the old record being 2:19.7. In the football throw, White of Dorris beat the former record of 166 feet with a throw of 170 feet 1 inch. Alois of the Lassen high of Susanville beat the shotput record of 51 feet 8 inches, with a heave of 53 feet 4 inches. These were all in the "B" class events. Don Linville of Modoc high ran the 440 in :53.4.

Modoc won the event with 73 points. Lakeview was second with 55 points and Lassen took third with 44 points. McCreary of Modoc took the individual honors when he copied three firsts. A dance held in the high school gym in the evening furnished the visitors entertainment after the day's grind.

Three Klamath trackmen placed in the Alturas meet Saturday out of 22 Pelican secondary lads who made the trip south.

Jack Gillette coped a first in the "A" class high jump with a leap of 5 feet 8 inches for the only Klamath win. In the 440 Ken Aber pushed into a second place as a new record of :53.4 was being set. Vallaincour took fourth in the 220.
