RALLY PUSHES STOCK MARKET FAVORITES UP

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP)—The stock market took another nip of rallying stimulus today and favorites bounded as much as a point or so before the effect of the potato tapered.

Transfers were around 500,000 shares.

Credit for the extension of Monday's belated comeback was given mainly to settlement of the soft coal strike through intervention of the president. This, brokers said, offset to a considerable extent persistent bearishness over the war news and the outlook for burdensome taxes. Moderately optimistic business indicators also were helpful.

Stocks up most of the session included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Atlantic Coast Line, Gulf Mobile & Ohio preferred, Union Carbide, Air Reduction, Loft, N. Y. Shipbuilding, Texas Corp., Standard Oil of Cal., J. C. Penney, United Aircraft, Sperry, Sears Roebuck, U. S. Rubber and J. I. Case. Nickel Plate preferred touched a new high for the year.

WOOL MARKET BOSTON, April 29 (AP)—Only a few scattered sales were being closed in the Boston wool market today. Graded combing three-eighties and quarter-blood bright fleeces wool was sold occasionally at prices ranging 44-46 cents, in the grease, delivered to users, for shipment from the country. Bulk French combing fine territory wools, in original bags, were receiving a very moderate demand at \$1.00-1.02, scoured basis.

WHEAT TURNS DOWN AFTER FLUCTUATING

CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—Despite strength in the deferred contracts, May wheat turned downward in the final hour after fluctuating nervously throughout the session.

At the close May was 1-1/4 cent lower, or slightly above the day's lowest but the new crop contracts finished with gains ranging up to 3 cents.

Strength in the deferred deliveries was attributed to reports that the house was about ready to take up the Fulmer farm aid bill which would grant loans on agricultural products based on 75 per cent of parity. A better showing by surrounding commodities and by securities also had a bolstering effect much of the time. War news was virtually ignored.

Closing prices for wheat were 1 cent lower to 1/2 cent higher than Monday's final quotations. May 914-c; corn was 1/2 cent off to 1/4 up, May 681, July 681-c and oats were 1/2 cent lower to 1/4 higher.
