FIGURES ON LIFE INSURANCE GIVEN

SALEM, April 29 (AP)—Life insurance in force in Oregon on December 31, 1940, totaled \$756,087,530 in 494,027 policies, a report of the state insurance commissioner revealed Monday.

Life insurance premiums paid during the year 1940 totaled \$22,306,929 and claims paid amounted to \$12,192,409.

The report showed \$8,517,579 was received in premiums on all classes of insurance in 1940 by stock fire insurance companies, which paid out \$3,821,051 in losses. Fire insurance premiums were \$3,927,588 with \$1,841,484 in losses paid. Motor vehicle insurance premiums were \$3,323,638 with losses of \$1,517,390 paid.

Premiums of \$3,238 were received for earthquake insurance. No losses were paid.

Mutual fire insurance companies received \$1,440,062 in premiums and paid \$778,976 in losses. Premiums received by casualty and disability insurance companies aggregated \$8,152,079 and losses paid totaled \$3,382,312. They included:

Accident and health, premiums \$2,119,373, losses, \$1,192,202; burglary and theft, premiums \$196,531, losses \$83,298; auto, fire and theft, premiums \$159,079, losses \$47,458; auto liability, premiums, \$2,433,870, losses, \$1,071,534; auto property damage premiums, \$794,216, losses, \$353,083; auto collision, premiums, \$467,324, losses, \$202,773.

Negroes May Ride In Same Cars as Whites, Court Says

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The supreme court held today that negroes traveling from one state to another are entitled to railroad accommodations equal to those furnished white persons.

Chief Justice Hughes delivered the decision on a test case brought by Representative Arthur W. Mitchell (D-Ill.), the only negro member of congress. No dissent was announced.

Mitchell contended that he had been "forcibly ejected" from a Pullman in Arkansas, while traveling from Chicago to Hot Springs in 1937, and had been compelled to complete the journey "in a jim crow car with second class accommodations."

"This," Hughes asserted, "was manifestly a discrimination against him in the course of his interstate journey and admitted that discrimination was based solely upon the fact that he was a negro."

"The question whether this

was a discrimination forbidden by the interstate commerce act is not a question of segregation but one of equality of treatment. The denial to appellant Mitchell of equality of accommodations because of his race would be an invasion of a fundamental individual right which is guaranteed against state action by the 14th amendment, and in view of the nature of the right and of our constitutional policy it cannot be maintained that the discrimination as it was alleged was not essentially unjust."

REDUCTION OF POULTRY, EGG PRICES EYED

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—Reduced poultry and egg prices are the goal of a survey of the nation's leading markets being made by the bureau of agricultural economics in cooperation with the surplus marketing administration and the agricultural marketing service.

Cities whose markets are being studied by experts under the direction of W. C. Crow, bureau of agricultural economics specialists, include Portland, Ore.

The egg and poultry survey was modeled after a similar study made recently in 40 leading fruit and vegetable markets. This survey, Crow said, resulted in economies in the costs of distribution which have been passed on to consumers.

"We know that something is wrong with present methods of marketing poultry and eggs," Crow said, "but opinions vary widely as to the exact trouble. There is even a lack of agreement within the industry itself on this point. Through a nationwide survey we hope to uncover the problems that are common to producers, distributors and consumers. Then we will be ready to make our recommendations."

Individual markets in each of the 29 cities being surveyed will be mapped and their facilities listed. The listing of facilities will include information on when the market was established, important alterations that have been made, ownership and control, rents, physical appearance, a description of handling methods, movement through the market, and the efficiency of the various facilities.

A study of market operations included classification of dealers and services, service agencies in the market, market practices, grading and inspection, health laws and regulations affecting eggs and poultry, selling hours, and market statistics.

Cities whose markets have been listed for study include Atlanta, Baltimore, Birmingham, Boston, Buffalo, Chicago, Cin-

cinnati, Cleveland, Dallas, Denver, Detroit, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Kansas City, Mo., Kansas City, Kan., Los Angeles, Louisville, Memphis, Minneapolis, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Portland, Ore., St. Louis, St. Paul, San Francisco, Seattle and Washington, D. C.
