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BONNEVILLE POWER PLANS DISCUSSED

Preliminary discussion of a schedule of meetings and of boundaries for a proposed public utilities district here, took place at a meeting of the Bonneville power committee in the labor temple Tuesday night, according to Secretary A. M. Thomas.

Decision on these matters was postponed until the next meeting, May 13, when a representative of the Bonneville administration is expected to be here with additional data.

The committee hereafter will meet regularly on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at the Willard hotel, according to Thomas. Any one interested in the proposed public power program for this district is welcome, he said.

The secretary stated 34 new members were taken into the organization Tuesday evening.

\$101,900 APPROVED FOR CRATER LAKE

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The house appropriations committee recommended today that appropriations for national

park be increased and that \$2,000,000 authorized for roads and trails last year be allowed. Among amounts recommended for the parks were Crater lake, Oregon, \$101,900; Lassen Volcanic, California, \$63,378; Mount Rainier, Washington, \$155,975; Olympic, Washington, \$69,450; Yellowstone, Wyoming, \$467,840.

It recommended \$358,425 for additional monuments.
