

KLAMATH BUYS \$15,000 WORTH OF U. S. BONDS

Indications were Friday that between \$15,000 and \$20,000 in defense bond and stamp purchases by Klamath individuals and businesses occurred on Thursday, first day of the sales drive.

Increasing interest in the defense bond purchases was reported at the postoffice, First National and U. S. National banks, and First Federal Savings and Loan association, where bonds and stamps may be obtained.

Stamp sales were reported by the postoffice at \$42.85, most of them in the small denominations.

PORTLAND, May 2 (AP)—Two Oregon towns went over the top on national defense bond purchases yesterday—the opening day of the sales drive. One was Portland, the other tiny Toledo.

Postmaster Rosemary Schenck reported that her supply of \$25 and \$50 bonds was sold out by noon and Toledo residents still stood in line to make purchases. Ramsey Black, third assistant postmaster general, in reply to a rush order for additional bonds, said more would be printed but that none were available at once.

The Toledo office sold over \$1000 in bonds and \$100 in defense stamps.

At Portland, banks estimated the opening day sales at \$250,000 with the principal call for 25-cent stamps and \$25 bonds.

One bank reported three applications for \$50,000 in bonds and two for \$10,000. Two banks ran out of 25-cent stamps and had to replenish supplies.

Postmaster Denies Mail Refused to Wards at Portland

PORTLAND, May 2 (AP)—Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Portland postmaster, denied mail service has been refused the Montgomery Ward & Company store which advertised yesterday that it would close Saturday.

The firm, in an advertisement appearing in Portland newspapers, said picketing of the plant since Dec. 7, 1940, by members of the AFL Warehousemen's, Retail Clerks' and Office Workers' unions had forced the decision to close.

It has been unable to get truck, rail or postal deliveries, the company's ad declared. Dr. Hedlund pointed out that his department had rented an additional building to care for increased parcel post business which had piled up since the strike started, but that deliveries continued at only the "ordinary rate."

"We had to rent extra space because our quarters have been filled to capacity for some time," he said. "There has been a 50 per cent increase in Portland's postal receipts since 1934."

"Incoming parcel post has been so heavy we have been unable to handle it with available facilities."

"We do not own the vehicles transporting parcel post. Delivery is by contract carrier. Since Ward has been shipping by parcel post merchandise formerly sent by express or freight, these vehicles have had to make more trips than the contract called for. No provisions to pay additional remuneration for additional trips is contained in the contract."

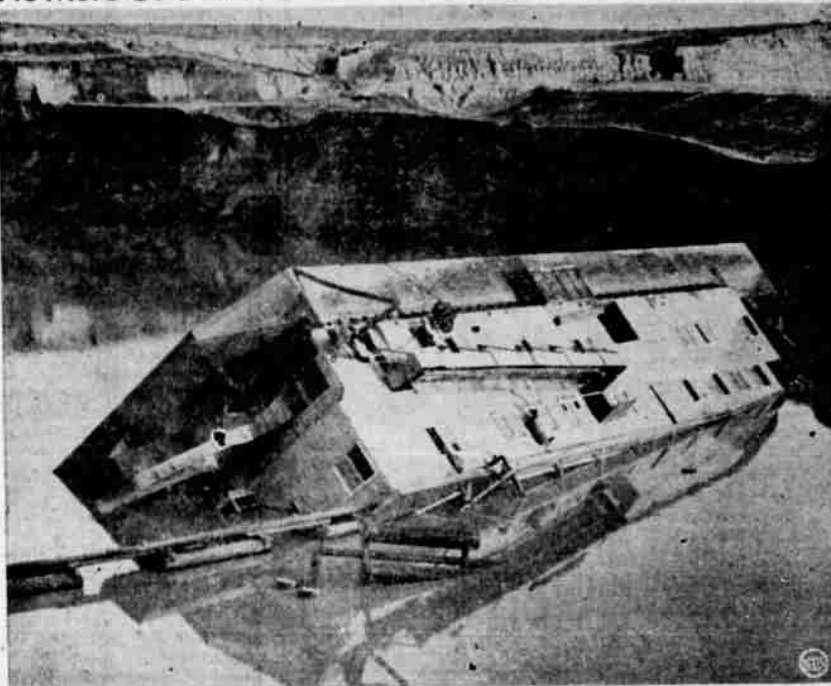

means more than filling the stomach with foods that appease hunger. It is more than getting the food that barely protects the body from disease due directly to poor diet. It is having each day the kind of food that will

Inadequate Diets Found

"Studies summarized in this report indicate that millions of people in this country are living on diets that are below the safety line. This does not mean that all of these people are hungry. Some often are. Nor do all that subsist on poor diets show symptoms of pellagra, beriberi, scurvy, anemia, or other well-defined disease. For every case of actual illness traceable to poor diet there are probably hundreds of borderline cases.

"Getting along on poor diets for weeks at a time takes its toll in chronic fatigue, shifting aches and pains, and certain kinds of digestive disturbances. While such discomforts may not keep a person in bed, they cut down his efficiency on the job.

"The nation's families need good diets to safeguard their own health and to strengthen the defenses of the country."

NO TRACE FOUND OF INDIAN BODIES

No trace of the bodies of Ted Walker and Tom Smith, Indians, who lost their lives in the tragedy early Wednesday morning which also claimed lives of three others, had been found by government officers who continued the search Friday along the main canal.

A close check assured officers the two men had lost their lives in the canal. There had been some consideration of the possibility that Walker and Smith might have reached the canal bank in safety and returned to their homes.

Lumber Production Above Average of 1935-39, Report

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—The National Lumber Manufacturers association reports today that lumber production for the week ended April 26 stood at 124 per cent of the average of the corresponding week 1935-39 and shipments 114 per cent.

Production totaled 249,278,000 feet, which was 3 per cent less than the previous week, and 9 per cent greater than the corresponding week a year ago.

Shipments aggregated 254,719,000 feet, which was 1 per cent greater than the previous week, and 7 per cent greater than last year's corresponding week.

Orders booked were 261,531,000 feet, which was 3 per cent greater than the previous week, and 12 per cent greater than the corresponding week last year.

Experts Seeking Way to Rescue Captive Salmon

OREGON CITY, May 2 (AP)—State fisheries men today pondered ways to rescue a school of spring chinook salmon which stumbled into a "pothole" on the east shore of the Willamette river recently.

They said between 3500 and 15,000 fish, bound for upriver spawning grounds, somehow got off the piscatorial beam, wandered across a network of shallow rivulets and spilled into the trap. A channel was blasted through rock barriers to the main stream but only a few of the fish tailed out. Boulders on the bottom made it impossible to seine the fish out and lift them to open water.

Yesterday a quantity of fresh blood from a slaughter house was dumped into the water in an effort to drive the captives out but the taint succeeded only in whipping the fish into a frenzy. The blood speedily diluted and the ruse had no beneficial effect.

San Diego 'Bombed' As Plane Drops Piece of Raft

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 2 (AP)—San Diego was "bombed" today by a huge, four-motored British bomber when the camouflaged craft, while flying low near the police station, dropped a life raft compartment cover and a deflated rubber life raft, the latter narrowly missing a workman.

The life raft compartment cover, made of ribbed sheet metal, fell in a parking lot, where attendants reported a man picked it up and "made off with

it." The deflated rubber life raft, rolled in yellow canvas to make a cylinder about four feet in length and about a foot in diameter, fell in a lumber yard.

WEEK DAYS and SATURDAYS 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.

At a special meeting of the Retail Trade Bureau of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, it was decided to change the retail store hours to six o'clock on Saturday nights instead of the usual eight o'clock closing hour. The following resolution was proposed and unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTION

"Resolved that in line with the present trend throughout the entire country, it is no longer necessary to keep the retail stores open on Saturday nights, that industrial workers, mill workers and rural consumers no longer find it necessary to wait until Saturday night to shop.

"And further, for the consideration of all employees to enjoy more leisure hours, allowing them to make plans for weekends, etc., the following store hours were suggested to be effective May 1, 1941: week days and Saturdays from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

"And be it further resolved, that in fairness to all merchants, store doors are to be locked at 6 p. m., allowing reasonable time for stores to be emptied of customers.

"The above agreement to be signed below and receive full publicity for the benefit of the consumer."
