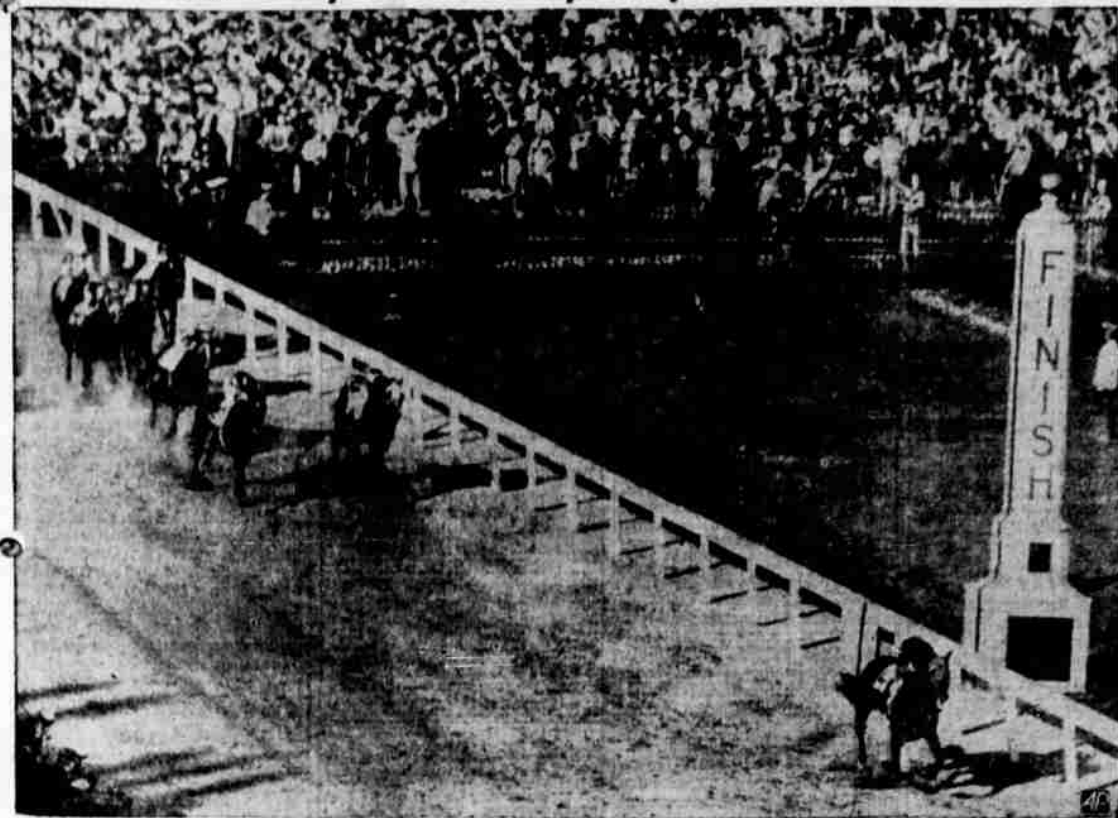


Whirlaway Wins Kentucky Derby; Sets New Record

Storms at Portland and Seattle washed out half the day's double-header program, leaving Hollywood and Oakland, San Francisco and Los Angeles in charge of carrying the Pacific Coast league torch yesterday.

They fulfilled the trust magnificently. Off their composite bat rattled 98 hits good for 64 runs, an average of 25 and 16 for each of four games even though one of the quartet lasted only seven innings and in another the losing side was limited to four safe blows.

The four teams finished the

day's pursuits all square. Oakland splitting with Hollywood 13-3 and 1-9, and San Francisco dividing with Los Angeles 11-5 and 10-11.

To the Oaks went honors for greatest production of hits over any single inning stretch. They made 21 in winning their Sunday opener. Mel Dueszabou cracked the first pitch by Wayne Osborne, lead-off man in a series of four. Hollywood flingers, for a home run, and Mike Christoff connected four times in four appearances, his collection including a pair of doubles.

Saturday's results were in moderate contrast to yesterday's adding-machine operations. Ed Stutz turned in his customary weekend pitching gem — this time a two-hitter — to give San

Francisco a 5-1 decision over Los Angeles. Oakland trimmed Hollywood 7-4, and Seattle nipped San Diego 4-3 on three ninth-inning runs.

Sacramento took both ends of a double header against Portland, 7-3 and 5-3, for a 3-1 edge in the rain-shortened series. That was the same margin by which Seattle finished above San Diego in another four-game stand.

The Rainiers and the Padres continue hostilities this week at the other end of the loop, and have scheduled doubleheaders Wednesday and Friday nights in an attempt to make up part of the postponements. Portland shifts south to San Francisco. Oakland invades Sacramento and Hollywood plays at Los Angeles.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5 (AP) — Reed college's worries are over. William D. McElroy, an assistant professor whose talent for science overflowed onto the football field, is going to leave the campus.

Reed indulges moderately in athletics. Its sports program is strictly for exercise. The win-or-die spirit is eclipsed by the textbooks.

Reed was shocked in 1939 to discover that McElroy had master-minded the football team through an undefeated season. It had never happened before, and professors feared for the academic attitude.

When Reed went through half of last year's schedule without a loss things got critical, there was talk of getting another coach.

But yesterday the situation corrected itself. Reed disclosed that McElroy had accepted a biology research scholarship at Princeton university.

will end, he added, "is a secondary question; the main thing is that the German people are convinced German victory is coming — when it comes does not concern us."

He did not refer to the United States by name in his 70-minute address but some of his references were interpreted as applying to that nation. At one point, after lambasting British Prime Minister Winston Churchill with savage phrases and announcing Germany's losses in soldiers slain in the Balkans at but 1151 officers and men, Hitler declared:

"When today democratic agitators of a country which the German people never harmed and whose statement that the German people intend to do so is an absurd lie, threaten to throttle the national socialist peoples' state with the force of their capitalist system, then there is only one answer: 'The German people will never again experience such a year as 1918.'"

Chestnut's Fate—Rags Or 3-Year-Old Crown To Be Decided Saturday

New YORK, May 5 (AP) — Whether Whirlaway, the vagabond King of the turf, returns to rags and rogue-like ways or takes a stranglehold on the three-year-old crown will be determined Saturday when the Kentucky derby winner hooks up with Bold Irishman in the \$75,000 Preakness at Pimlico.

It's going to be a mighty long time before Whirlaway's record-smashing performance in the derby is forgotten by the 100,000 who saw the little chestnut burn up Churchill Downs home stretch Saturday with 2:01 2/5 clocking, beating Twenty Grand's mark by 2/5 of a second. But in Bold Irishman from Mrs. H. C. Phipps' Wheatley stable, he'll meet a horse that also can turn on the heat in the final drive.

lifetime on the Klamath reservation and was 40 years of age at the time of his death. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Walker, one daughter, Theodora, Beatty, and one son, Melvin Harold, Sprague River. Bodies of both men are at Ward's Klamath Funeral Home.

Both Smith and Walker were passengers in a car driven by Gertrude Barkley Duffy which plunged into the canal early Wednesday morning of last week. Five persons lost their lives including Mrs. Duffy, Edna George and her infant daughter, Mavis, and the two men. Florida Davis, sixth passenger, managed to free herself from the car and reach the bank.

Officers were notified of the tragedy and Mrs. George's body recovered when the machine was pulled from the canal. Bodies of Mrs. Duffy and Mavis George were found six miles downstream near the reclamation south branch gates of the power plant a few hours later. The tragedy brought Klamath's traffic death toll to eight for the year.

BERLIN, May 5 — Luftwaffe raiders pounding Belfast, Northern Ireland, last night set afire four ships in the harbor and started tremendous fires and explosions in aircraft industrial plants. The German high command announced today.

The daily war bulletin spoke of Belfast as "an important transit harbor," referring, apparently to its possible use as a receiving point for war supplies from the United States.

Barrow-in-Furness, port 50 miles northwest of Liverpool, drew one of the heaviest assaults aimed at this west coast area, the high command said.

Cardinal Hurlers Too Good To Lose

New Rule Forces Cut In Squad by Thursday; Redbirds, Indians Win

It hardly seems possible that the manager of a team that is riding the top of the National league on the crest of a 10-game winning streak would be glooming at his ill luck but Billy Southworth was a sorely-ried man Monday.

His St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Boston Braves, 5-1 behind the five-hit pitching of Rookie Ernie White and there, in one bundle, is Southworth's trouble—pitching—too good and too much of it.

Major league rules will force him to cut his squad to 25 active players next Thursday.

As the Cardinals' pitching staff now stands it numbers 11 men—five rookies and six veterans. All have pitched well except the veteran Bill McGee. If Southworth is to get within the league player limit he will have to trim two men from his mound corps by May 15, the deadline. But he can't decide which two must go.

McGee Eyed
The finger points to McGee, only starting pitcher without a victory, but the 28-year-old righthander won 16 games last year and should straighten out. The other veterans, Lon Warneke and Mort Cooper have won three each and Max Lanier, two. All of the rookies have scored impressively. Sam Nahem and Johnny Grodzicki beat Pittsburgh and New York, the latter in two relief roles. Howie Kries whipped the Philadelphia Phillies with five hits and Hank Gornicky molded a one-hitter against the same club.

White made his initial start Monday and beat the Braves with five hits. Pinch-hitter Max West's homer in the eighth accounted for the Braves' only run. The triumph widened the Cards' league lead to 13 games.

Relief Jobs
The only other two pitchers—Clyde Shoun and Ira Hutchinson—are scheduled for relief jobs.

All other games in the National league Monday were postponed because of rain and threatening weather.

In the American league the Cleveland Indians won their 11th straight, defeating Washington, 2-1. Bob Feller fanned 12 and walked seven as he held the Senators to three hits, for his fifth victory. Rolfe Hemley singled home Lou Boudreau with the deciding run off Ken Chase in the ninth inning to increase the Indians league lead to 4 1/2 games.

A five-run rally in the third inning featured by Pinky Higgins' long double with the bases loaded knocked out Lefty Gomez and gave the Detroit Tigers a 7-3 victory over the New York Yankees.

Rookie Pitcher Les McCrabb, making his second start, pitched and batted the Philadelphia Athletics to a 5-4, 11-inning win over the Chicago White Sox. The loss was the third in a row for the Sox and dropped them into a third-place tie with the Tigers.

Boston at St. Louis was rained out.

Les Steers Misses Second Record Try
EUGENE, May 5 (AP) — By a scant quarter-inch Les Steers missed tying his own unofficial world record high jump here Saturday as Washington State college defeated the University of Oregon track team, 72-23 to 58-13.

Oregon's sensational jumper went over the bar at 6 feet, 10 1/2 inches for a new meet and field record in the northern division Pacific coast conference event. His record jump, made a week ago at Seattle, was 6 feet, 10 25-32 inches.

8 Records Fall at Pacific Meet

BERKELEY, Cal., May 3 (UP) — Seven of the west's finest track and field stars broke eight records and tied another today at the Pacific association meet by the Olympic Club of San Francisco with a total of 68 points. California was second with 541, Sacramento J. C. fourth, 241 and Stanford fifth, 161.

Harold Davis, Salinas Junior College speedster, broke three records in his two favorite races, the 100 and 220 yard dashes. He set a new world's junior college record of 20.5 seconds in the 220, lowering the old mark of 20.6 seconds by one-tenth of a second. He ran this race against a five-mile-an-hour wind. His 220 performance also shattered the old P. A. meet record and the Edwards Stadium record.

Davis won the 100 yard dash in 9.6 seconds, tying the old meet mark held by Ray Dean of Stanford.

"Club Law" Talked
Also referred to the city attorney was a matter brought to the council by Harry Molatore, operator of Molatore's. He said his establishment, while primarily a restaurant, was required to comply with the new state "club law," but that he didn't wish his place to be classed as a club by the city, which levies a \$500 operating license on drink clubs. Molatore said he believed most of the restaurants in town would come under the new law.

The opinion of the council was that the city club license applied only to establishments serving members only.

Official notice of the national defense program was taken by Mayor John Houston when he changed the council's public works committee to the public works and defense committee. Bussman is chairman of the body.
