RAILS CLIMB, OTHER STOCKS HIT DECLINE

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Diverse trends prevailed in today's stock market, with scattered rails edging into new high ground for the year and a number of industrials dipping to lowest levels since last June. Transfers were around 400,000 shares.

There was not enough change in the news picture to inspire pronounced speculative shifts in either direction, brokers said.

Persistent strength of import staples such as cocoa, coffee, sugar and silk, reflecting likelihood of shipping shortages, served as a mild bolstering influence.

U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic and Youngstown Sheet improved when it was estimated this week's mill operations would rebound 2.5 points at 96.8 per cent of capacity in the wake of settlement of the coal strike.

In the "new high" classification were Nickel Plate Preferred, Santa Fe, Atlantic Coast Line, Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and Pere Marquette Preferred.

Among "new lows" were Chrysler, General Motors, General Electric, Westinghouse and North American.

Secondary railway loans again were in the front ranks of the bond division.

PROFIT TAKING IN WHEAT BLOCKS RISE

CHICAGO, May 5 (AP)—An attempt to extend the sharp grain price advance ran into heavy profit taking today after wheat and corn rose a cent or more to 95 and 70 1/2 cents a bushel respectively for May delivery. A car of No. 2 hard wheat sold up to 97 1/4 in the spot market while old yellow corn was priced above 73.

These wheat prices were the highest since last May while corn was the highest in almost four years.

The government wheat loan program and strength of cotton and cottonseed oil were bullish market factors early in the session but when these commodities reacted profit taking reduced or wiped out grain price gains, wheat falling as much as 1/2 cent below the Saturday close at on time.

Wheat closed 1/2 cent lower to 94 1/2 higher compared with Saturday, May 4, at 94 1/2. July 92 1/2; corn 1/4-1/2 higher, May 69 1/4, July 69 1/4; oats unchanged to 1/2 cent lower.

Nude Bodies of Couple Found in Gas-Filled Garage

GREENWICH, Conn., May 5 (UP)—Nude bodies of a 32-year-old chauffeur and a unidentified auburn-haired woman, about 25, were found in a gas-filled garage on Henry Mann's game cock island estate Saturday by the chauffeur's wife.

Authorities said the couple had been dead about 10 hours and attributed the cause to accidental suffocation.

Mrs. Werner P. Lucas, the chauffeur's wife of eight months, told police he left home about 9 o'clock the night before, saying he wanted to get some coffee and drop in at the local fire department, of which he was a member. When he did not return, Mrs. Lucas telephoned the fire department and was told her husband had already left.

Saturday, Mrs. Lucas made a tour of the grounds. She found the garage locked but heard a motor running inside. She called police who forced an entrance.

The bodies were in the front seat of the chauffeur's automobile. The woman had not removed her silk stockings. She wore a wrist watch which bore the initials "N. J. U."

Medical Examiner Dr. John A. Clark said the dead couple's clothes were strewn about the floor of the automobile. He said it was possible that they were intoxicated.
