(Continued from Page One) menace to Russia's own frontiers.

Stalin has been secretary of the central committee of the communist party since 1922, a member of the presidium of the supreme council of the USSR and a member of the executive committee of the Communist International.

The presidium on which he sat is composed of a president—Kalinin—and 11 vice presidents, one for each constituent republic of the soviet union, and 24 members. The body serves, in effect, as an administrative group under the supreme council made up of 369 members from all parts of Russia's realm.

Molotov, premier since 1931 and re-elected by the supreme soviet in January of 1938, because foreign commissar on May 4, 1939, just four months before the outbreak of the war when he suddenly was chosen to replace Maxim Litvinov.

In August of 1939 Molotov played a chief role in the conclusion of the Russian-German pact, handled the diplomatic angles of the conflict with Finland, visited Berlin for consultations several months ago and more recently signed Russia's name to the new membership pact with Japan.

# NAZI-PLANNED FRENCH SYRIA COUP FEARED

(Continued from Page One) bore being arrested by Iraqi troops.

The Berlin radio said British planes had raided the Iraqi capital, killed or wounded several civilians and damaged a Mosque, in addition to bombing other so-called "open towns" during the last 24 hours.

The British middle east command at Cairo reported heavy bombing of Iraqi military positions around Habbaniya, where direct hits were scored, across the Euphrates near Falluja where motor transports columns were blasted and in the Diwaniya sector 80 miles south of Baghdad on the Euphrates.

Around Habbaniya the shelling of the air base was reduced to "intermittent and inaccurate" fire, it was said.

In the Basra area, it was stated officially, the "situation remains quiet" after the driving of Iraqi forces from the vicinity.

# DEDICATION OF NEW S. A. HOME BEING MAPPED

Tentative plans for a dedication, open house and cornerstone laying for the new Salvation Army home at Fourth street and Klamath avenue were shaped at a meeting of the army board at the chamber of commerce Tuesday noon.

The building is now being remodeled and will be finished in about a month, it was stated by Adjutant Norman Bowyer.

He said that former County Judge George Grizzle has presented a cornerstone for the structure. The board decided that laying of the stone would afford opportunity for inviting the public to look over the new quarters, said to represent values in excess of \$20,000 although costing the Salvation Army only about half that amount.

Further plans for the public event will be announced later. Adjutant Bowyer told the board that the gymnasium in the new building would be available for Boy Scouts and other community groups which might wish to use it.

Fair success was reported from the recent effort to raise sufficient funds to cover the costs of completing the remodeling work. Between \$400 and \$500 is needed, and further effort will be made to obtain this amount.

# PEPPER URGES 'TOUGH' PLAN

(Continued from Page One) said in a speech prepared for senate delivery:

"Too Long"  
"We must stifle threats against us near their source. We have already waited too long. If we continue a pussy-footing policy the foe will not fear us and our friends will not respect us."

Speaking of lease-lend cargoes, Pepper asserted that the country "should resolve that no power will keep us from getting the goods to Britain, and getting them there now."

It was up to military and naval experts, he added, to decide on the best method for guaranteeing safe delivery.

As far as Hitler was concerned, Pepper said that the United States should react to him as it had to the Barbary coast pirates in the early years of the last century, and to the gangsters of the Dillinger days.

He then proposed that the president declare and congress approve a "state of national emergency—a state in which the government would have power similar to the war power."

Continuing, he said:  
"I propose that we close exits of Europe, Africa and Asia against any possible attack upon our continent. I mean that we should not allow the axis to occupy Greenland, Iceland, the Azores, the Cape Verde islands, the Canary islands, Singapore or Dakar. We know that if they do occupy them it will only be to have a vantage point from which to jump at our throat."

"I propose that the United States, in cooperation with Great Britain, occupy all those territories so we may stifle near its source this threat which we know to be aimed against us."

"If we occupy these territories we can keep the sea lanes of Britain open with our navy and our airforce."

(Continued from Page One) plane was missing but that the pilot of the latter was safe.

The government acknowledged that "much damage" was done in the Clydeside area, which the nazis attacked in re-lays for several hours, and indicated that the toll of dead and wounded might be heavy.

Considerable damage also was reported in the Mersey river shipping center at Liverpool, attacked for the fifth consecutive night.

The British asserted, however, they downed eight German planes during the night and said their own air force hammered western Germany. The big industrial center of Mannheim was said to have been the main target of the RAF.

Belfast, subjected Sunday night to a heavy attack, was one of the objectives on which the Germans loosed bombs in northern Ireland during the dark hours before dawn today.

Hopkins, it was said, has been virtually a clearing house on the lease-lend program, with representatives of governments seeking assistance coming to him with their requests. Burns will go into the office of emergency management, in the executive office of the president, as executive officer of a new division of defense aid reports.

It was the president's belief, said Stephen Early, a secretary, that the job could be done better by a military man, with an understanding of the whole picture, than by a civilian.

It took a military order by Mr. Roosevelt as commander-in-chief of the armed forces to give Burns the new job.

The division of defense aid reports was created by a presidential executive order, which said it was to "provide a central channel for the clearance of transactions and reports, and coordinate the processing of requests for aid under the (lease-lend) act."
