OVERSIGHT BOOSTS SEASONAL BENEFITS

SALEM, May 7 (AP)—Because of an oversight in making last minute amendments in the unemployment compensation law in the 1941 legislature, one-fifth instead of one-sixth of non-seasonal earnings may be drawn by seasonal employees, ruled General I. H. Van Winkle today. The opinion was asked by the state unemployment compensation commission. The last minute oversight occurred when compromise bills were being hastily drawn by a senate and house conference committee in the last hours of the legislature. When the senate committee's "one-fifth" provision was finally changed back to "one-sixth" by the conferees the change was made in all parts of the amendments excepting in the provision for non-seasonal benefits. While seasonal claimants may draw slightly more during their off season, their total benefits will not be increased as they are still limited to one-sixth of the base year earnings.

NO DATE FIXED FOR TRAFFIC LIGHT JOB

Klamath Falls' city traffic lights loomed a little brighter with the date set for opening bids Thursday, May 8, in Portland when the state highway commission meets in session.
