HEALTH STUDY OF TULE LAKE WATER MADE

TULE LAKE—City water users are informed by Harold Roath, city clerk, that an analysis of the city water received this week from the state department of health, Sacramento, showed a decided improvement over previous tests, sediment being diminished and the degree of hardness less. Calcium content, however, Roath stated, had increased. Continued pumping from the deep bore is expected to improve the flow which still registers a minimum of sediment.

The council, in a brief session Monday night, was informed that the Neon signs, contracted for by the city and the chamber of commerce will be swung this week, probably on Thursday, from the monuments that guard the entrance to Tulelake from the Canby-Hatfield highway.

The council, which for the past three years has met weekly, looks forward to a slack in council duties with the completion of the sewer system in the near future.

Cement Pouring Nearly Ready in Irrigation Job

WESTSIDE—The work of getting ready to pour cement is well under way at Unit No. 5 of the repair and construction work being done on the irrigation system of the Lakeview Water Users, Incorporated. Already completed are Units 1, 2, 6 and 7, and the finishing up of unit 5, probably early next month, will mark the end of the present project.

Unit 5 is a 600-foot flume which takes the water of south Drews canal across Drews creek in the canyon. Crossed timbers will top the concrete substructure, and metal from old flumes of the system will carry the water.

BONANZANS WANT DIAL TELEPHONES

The town has been served for many years by a privately owned party line belonging to the Horsely irrigation district. There are only about a half dozen phones in the town, now with a population of approximately 250.

LOOKOUT TO STAY ATOP LAVA BUTTE

TULE LAKE—Schonchin butte, 3293 foot peak in the Lava Butte, will be occupied soon by a fire lookout who will spend the summer in the small rock and glass house built last fall by CCC enrollees. The building required 114 tons of material all "packed" to the top by the crew over a steep trail.

The room, 15 by 15 feet, will be bedroom, living room, kitchen and office. A small basement beneath the rock base will provide storage space and an overhanging eave will solve the problem of water for household use if rain falls.

A trail leads 4800 feet up the butte from car parking space and the trip to the top is not an arduous one, it is reported. The view from the top is well worth the climb, according to members of the park service and the boys who helped build the structure.

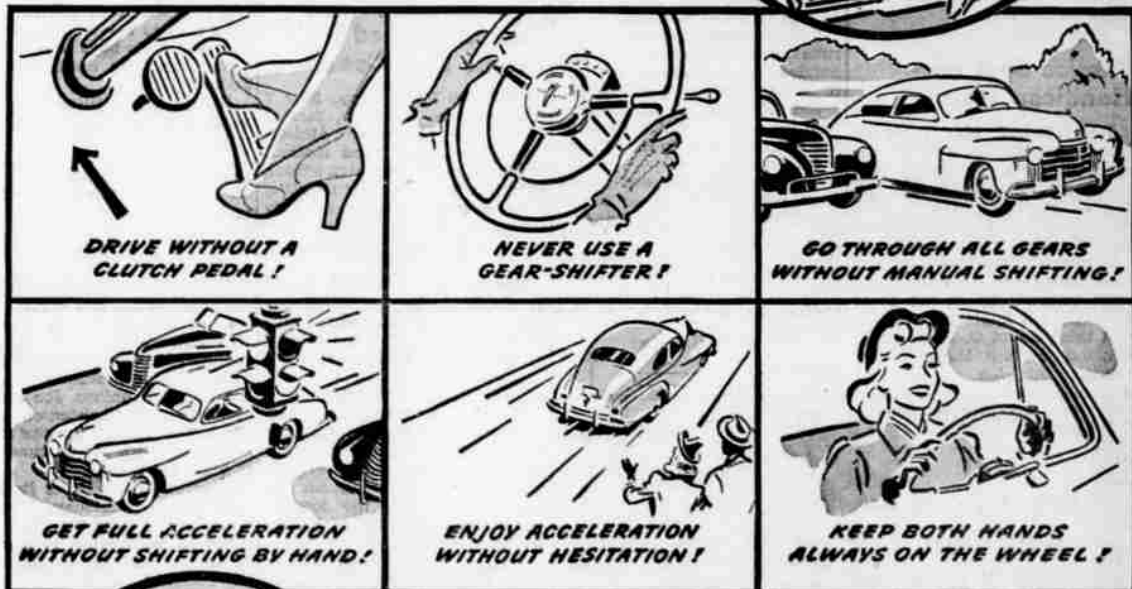
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
