The big question nowadays isn't, what's new? Or what do you think about the war? But, where is there any fishing?

Fishing prospects for this weekend are tough. Our suggestion would be to stay close to home and give the UPPER LAKE and its tributaries a good workout. There should really be some good fishing in and around Rocky Point. Gus Johnson tells me that some nice fish are being caught in HARRISMAN CREEK, just below the lodge on jigger wobbles. I predict that bait fishing with clus-

ter eggs will be good. Last weekend the KLAMATH RIVER was the best that it has been in months. Most of the fish taken were caught on 1/0 and 2/0 bucktail flies.

EAST LAKE has been very spotty. The road is in about the same condition as last week with chains a necessary piece of equipment. The fish taken have, with few exceptions, been caught on worms. A small double spinner backed with a worm seems to coax out the larger ones.

PAULINA LAKE shows little signs of improving. Some nice size fish have been taken on size fenders 2-tones with worms.

ODELL LAKE has fallen off. A few fish are being caught by the trollers and some late p. m. fishing with flies.

Incidentally, after about 6 p. m. the fishing seems to get better at EAST LAKE.

FISH LAKE hasn't responded very well this week. The fish caught are small and bait the only sure fire system.

The small streams and creeks in the vicinity are all high and fishing is away off. Anyone attempting to fish any of the streams or creeks in this vicinity should rely solely on single eggs or worms, with the possible exception of the Klamath river.

Don't forget to take a boy fishing. We have shown evidence through pictures and the printed word the good that can be done, besides being an outing for the boy.

Cooperate with the local drive to help prevent forest fires by starting right now to be careful. Remember 90 per cent of the fires started are through carelessness and are man-made. The problem then is really in our hands.

We who use the forest for our recreation and pleasure can in a big way help by being watchful and careful.

UO Track Team Wins

OSC Beaten, 77-54, As Heat Slows Steers' Try

EUGENE, Ore., May 10 (UP)—Sweetener heat slowed performances here today as the University of Oregon's track team beat Oregon State 77-54.

Oregon's Les Steers topped individual scoring with 12 points, but could clear only 688 in his specialty, the high jump.

Although a new meet record, it was far under his usual leaps. He captured the javelin, with 187 feet, 10 1/2 inch toss, and scored third in the discus and shot put.

Oregon's other multiple winner was Footballer Jake Leicht, junior college transfer, who took the 100 and 220 dashes.

Don Vallancourt, OSC distance ace, took the mile and two-mile, and Teammate Jim Holloway skinned the high hurdles in 15.3 and then won the low sticks to lead Beaver performances.

The Oregon State rooks founced Oregon's Ducklings, 72-13 to 40-23.

Pelicans Open State Play

Locals Face Bend On Elks Grounds

Sanders Believes Title Hopes Will Depend on Hurling; Davis May Start

A 15-man Pelican baseball squad, anxious to test its potential 1941 diamond strength, inaugurates the season's Oregon State league slate on one of three fronts when it engages the Bend Elks at Bend Sunday afternoon. Toledo meets Eugene at the latter city while Albany takes on Medford on their Sabbath day openers.

Manager Red Sanders reported following Friday's practice session that he was well satisfied with his boys and believed that with some good pitching the Pelicans would be among the contenders for the title.

Sanders disclosed Saturday morning that he would probably start Orin Davis, the big right-hander signed Thursday, against the Elks. Davis is a former Western International league performer, reportedly having hurled for Salem and Vancouver. Sanders stated that his newest moundman has had plenty of work this year and is ready for immediate action.

Wahner Peppery

Veteran Clyde Carlstrom and Virgil Haines, ex-University of Oregon pitcher, are the other two hurlers who will make the trip north to Bend. Either one or both may be used against the Elks.

Warren Wahner, peppery little receiver signed recently, will draw the backstop assignment if Davis goes to the hillcock. Lawrence Granger will be seen behind the plate if Carlstrom goes to the mound. Possibly both of the Pelican catchers will get a workout during the course of the afternoon.

With two left-handed hitting first basemen in Paul Crapo and Anthol Riney available for duty at the initial sack, Manager Sanders was still uncertain Saturday which one he would start Sunday. Both are good hitters, but Carl Read, regular Pelican rightfielder, will get the first base job, Sanders intimated, if Bill Hatch or any other south-paw opens on the mound for the Bend contingent.

Three Outfielders

Second base will be capably handled by Ernie Bishop, ex-Pioneer league keystone performer, while Arland "Babe" Schwab, former Portland Beaver infielder, will be stationed at third base. The ex-Whitman college baseball star, Don Jones, will open at shortstop. Jack Lloyd and Earl Brooks, infielders who played for the Klamath Red Sox and the Dorris Lumberjacks the past several seasons, are competent reserves for three inner defense positions, second, third or short.

Only three men, Paul Bernadou, Marshall Eyston and Carl Read, are listed as outfielders on the Pelican traveling squad for Sunday's game. However, other members of the local team such as Carlstrom, Wahner, Riney and Lloyd have had experience in the outer gardens and can be shifted to outfield positions if necessary. Bernadou, a former Klamath Red Sox infielder, is slated for the left field position. Another Klamathite, Eyston, who once held an outfield spot with last year's state league champions, Albany, will open in centerfield. Read, the ex-San Diego Padre baseballist, is scheduled to start in right field.

The Bend Elks loom as a strong club, and if the locals score a victory Sunday they will have gotten away to a flying start in their bid for a first division berth. Reports from the Deschutes country indicate that the Elks have recently signed some new players to strengthen their team.

Newest recruit appears to be Joe Volk, former Washington high school of Portland player, who is an outfielder. Jack Gordon, brother of Joe Gordon of New York Yankee fame, is the Bend third baseman.

Battery for the Elks will be either Southpaw Bill Hatch or Lyle Turpin, once a Klamath Red Sox hurler, on the mound and Merle Nehl behind the plate, according to Manager Clyde Stokoe.

The Pelican baseball club will leave for Bend by automobile from Molatore's cafe at 8 a. m. Sunday. Game time is set for 2 p. m.

Herman Lives Up To Brooklyn Hopes

Pennant Insurance Purchase Proves Good Investment; Reds Beat Cubs

A change in scenery was just what the doctor ordered for Billy Herman, who rocketed from the doldrums to batting brilliance just as soon as he shifted from the Chicago Cubs to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Purchased from the Cubs less than a week ago as pennant insurance, the hard-hitting second-sacker is living up to Dodgers' expectations. Herman, who had an average of 1.94 when he joined the Dodgers, has made 12 hits in 16 times at bat in four games, boosting his average to .388. And he climaxed his batting spurge Saturday when he hit "five for five."

Herman's hits featured the Dodgers' 12-hit attack that gave them a 4 to 1 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies. He started Brooklyn's two-run first inning with a single and later made two triples and two more singles. The triumph increased the Dodgers' league lead to two games over the St. Louis Cardinals and ran their winning string to four games. Whit Wyatt pitched five-hit ball to be credited with his sixth straight win.

Split Pair

The third-place New York Giants split a double-header with the Boston Braves. A 16-hit barrage that included homers by Max West, Bama Rowell, Eddie Miller and Babe Dahlgren gave the Braves the opener, 11-3. Bill Lohrman had a no-hitter in his grasp in the aftermath which the Giants won, 4-2, but, with one out in the ninth, Pinch-batter Johnny Cooney singled for the first of Boston's two hits.

The Cincinnati Reds scored more runs in their four-run fifth inning than they made in any of their previous nine games as they defeated the Chicago Cubs, 5-1. The St. Louis Cardinals-Pittsburgh Pirates game was postponed because of wet grounds and cold weather.

Two-Run Homer

In the American league, the leading Cleveland Indians ended their four-game losing streak with a 4 to 3 decision over the St. Louis Browns. Lou Boudreau's two-run homer capped a three-run winning spurge in the third inning.

Successive doubles by Mike Kreevich and Myril Hoag gave the White Sox a 4 to 3 victory over the Detroit Tigers, halting Chicago's losing string of four games. Thornton Lee held the Tigers to six hits for his third win.

The Philadelphia Athletics defeated the Washington Senators, but had to quell a four-run uprising in the ninth inning to do it. Nelson Potter gave up four hits in the ninth but the A's won when, with two out and the tying run on base, Mickey Vernon was out trying to take second on a passed ball by Catcher Frankie Hayes.

Rain postponed the game between the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox.

Oregon high school track athletes near the climax of their season Saturday in seven district meets that will determine qualifiers for the annual state meet at the University of Oregon next weekend. A flock of high jumpers and a pair of the fastest youths in Oregon commanded most of the attention. In eastern Oregon Wally Still of Milton-Freewater, state 100-yard dash champion, tried for new district one records at La Grande.

A lad who runs three miles to school each day, Raymond Johnson, Medford, was the other fleet youngster. He sought a new 440-yard record in the district three meet at Medford.

In the east division of district two at Bend last night, Bend's Lava Bears broke three marks. Dave Coleman pole-vaulted 11 feet 5 inches, Bob Anderson raced the quarter-mile in 53.4 seconds and Layton Ballard jogged the mile in 4:54.6 minutes. Bend scored 75 points, Redmond 44 and Prineville 5.

Whirlaway started slower than any horse in the field and trailed by almost 10 lengths King Cole, Dispose and Ocean rounding the first turn while Blue set the pace. Then Whirlaway came on with another of his sensational finishes to take the lead swinging into the home stretch and win as he pleased.

King Cole, owned by Ogden Phipps of New York, was two more lengths to the good of Our Boots at the end while C. S. Howard's Porter's Cap trailed by another fourth.
