Padres Climb Into Tie With Seattle

Thump Suds Over Weekend; Sacs Split With Oaks; Beavers Divide

San Diego climbed back into a second place tie with Seattle in the Pacific coast league baseball race by thumping the defending champions in three out of four games over the weekend.

It set a new low in the fortunes of the Rainiers by giving the series to San Diego, five games to four. The setback was the second in three series for Seattle, and it has been a long time since Emil Sick's habitual pennant winners have taken it on the chin that hard.

Seattle and San Diego divided two Sunday games, along with all the other teams in the league. Seattle took the first game 4-1, with Paul Gregory turning in a masterful six-hit mound job without allowing an earned run. San Diego took the second game 5-2 as Southpaw Al Olsen blanked the Rainiers until the last inning.

Oakland and Sacramento broke even in their Sunday

stand, Mike Christoff's homer with a man on base giving the Oaks a 7-6 edge in the nightcap after the Senators had opened with a 5-4 verdict.

In each case the deciding development came in the last frame. Christoff's long poke was a seventh-inning job, and in registering its success, Sacramento scored twice in the ninth to come from behind. Oakland won Saturday's game, 5-4, on four runs in the seventh.

After whitewashing Portland Saturday, 6-0, on Tom Seatz's three-hit pitching, San Francisco had to struggle more than three hours and through ten innings to finish ahead, 10-9, in yesterday's first game. The second went to the Beavers, 4-2, with Byron Speece blanking the Seals from the first inning on.

Only twice in seven games did Hollywood succeed in muffling the boom of the seventh place Los Angeles bats — and only once in three weekend tries.

That once was in the opener of yesterday's double header, which went to the Stars 13-1. Big Babe Herman, playing regularly at first base for one of the few times this year, connected for a homer, double and single to drive in five Hollywood runs.

Almost 100 Klamath Falls baseball fans witnessed an auspicious debut of the Pelican baseball club in state league competition Sunday afternoon at Bend as the locals slugged out a 6-4 triumph over the Elks in the season's opener for both clubs.

Pitcher Orin Davis of the Pelicans won his own ball game in the fourth inning with a three-run homer over the left field fence. Just prior to Davis' four-pylyr swat Catcher Warren Wahner had sacrificed runners to third and second base respectively, on a perfect bunt. First Baseman Paul Crapo had opened the inning with a scorching single to right and Don Jones, Klamath shortstop, was safe at first on Elk Third Baseman Jack Gordon's error.

Later in the same stanza Ernie Bishop singled and Marshall Eyestone was safe on still another Bend miscue. Third Baseman Babe Schwab slapped out his third straight single of the contest to score Bishop with the fourth run of the inning and gave the visitors a 6-1 lead. Carl Read flew out to left for the third out to end the rally.

Carlstrom Takes Over
The Elks kept plugging away at the Pelican five run lead with single tallies in the fourth, fifth and eighth innings. Pitcher Hatch accounted for the run in the fifth with a 350-foot circuit clout over the center field fence.

Manager Red Sanders rushed Clyde Carlstrom in to take over the mound chores in the last of the eighth when Davis, who had pitched nice ball, appeared to be tiring. Clyde walked Wally Kremer, Elk catcher, the first man to face him but he retired the next five men to face him to give Klamath the ball game, 6-4.

Hitting star for the Pelicans was Arland "Babe" Schwab, who garnered three singles in four trips to the plate. The affable Klamath third sacker, drove in three runs, two of which crossed the platter in the first inning.

Second Baseman Bishop opened the initial frame by getting a ticket to first when Pitcher Lyle Turpin tagged him below the chest with a fast one. Eyestone walked, and then the clever Klamath runners pulled the clever double steal on the bewildered Tommy Hawkins, catching for the Elks at the time. Schwab's timely blow sent Bishop and Eyestone scurrying home for the first two runs of the game.

Pelican Nine

(Ed's Note: Here's a new series on members of the Klamath Falls Pelican baseball team.)

Ernie Bishop, Pelican second baseman, took the eyes of all fans in the recent practice contest with the Medford Rogues. Ernie's smooth fielding actions and ability to get rid of the ball without loss of motion, made the tough chances look easy. He will play plenty of second base for the Pelicans this year.

Bishop, who is now 25, started baseball at Walla Walla high school, also playing American Junior Legion ball. His team went to the state of Washington finals, losing to Seattle. While attending Washington State college, Ernie made the freshman team and played varsity baseball for three years under Coach Buck Bailey.

Signed By Missions
In addition to baseball, Bishop turned out for basketball, making the squad in 1936 and 1937 as forward under Coach Jack Friel.

After completing college in 1937, Ernie signed with the San Francisco Missions, who optioned him to Lewiston, Idaho, then of the Western International league. He reported to Hollywood in 1938 (formerly Missions) and this time was optioned to Bellingham of the W. L. but an injured left leg forced him to retire a little later in the season.

Upon securing his Bellingham release, Bishop signed with Spokane in 1939 and was sent to the Class C Pioneer league, playing with Twin Falls Cowboys. Spokane recalled him in 1940 where he held down second base the early part of the season, later going to Twin Falls once more and finishing the season.

Due to the seasonality feature of professional baseball, Ernie decided to retire and settle down in Klamath Falls, where he is now employed. He is a very valuable asset to the Klamath Pelicans in both departments of hitting and fielding.

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KUHS Track Team Places 3 in State

Reginato Cracks Discus Record; McCandliss, Bocchi Cop Seconds
Klamath Falls' Pelican trackmen qualified three men for the state track and field finals next weekend Saturday in Eugene in the district 3 meet at Medford Saturday but lost to the Tigermen, 88-36. Grants Pass was third with 32 and Lakeview fourth with 24.

Outstanding performance of the sun-blessed meet was that of Pelican Co-Captain Marion Reginato, who hurled the discus 132 feet 3 inches to better the old district mark by more than 12 feet.

Hurdler Chuck McCandliss of the Klamaths placed second in each barrier event, thus qualifying for state competition. Slim Jim Bocchi took a second in the javelin to earn a place at Eugene.

Medford, paced by Racin' Ray Johnson and Andy LaMarr, scored nine first places and four seconds, to win its fifth straight district title and qualify 11 men.

Johnson tossed off a .496 quarter to crack the record and LaMarr copped two hurdle firsts.

Myrtle Point scored 10 points, Ashland and Henley six each, Jacksonville four, Chiloquin three and Phoenix two.

Highlight of the day to Klamath Coach Paul Deller was the showing of little Glen Kennedy in the 440. The young Pelican, placing a close third behind Johnson and Medford's Orr, was clocked by Deller in 31.5, exceptional time with anyone else but Johnson in the field.
