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reach the British forces in the Red Sea by way of the Cape of Good Hope or the Pacific and up through the Indian ocean.

"Every ship therefore coming within these waters faces the possibility of destruction by mines or other means of war," the official statement continued.

"The German government urgently warns against all shipping within the endangered area bounded as follows:

"The northern part of the Red Sea including the Gulf of Suez and the Gulf of Akaba to the northern returning point.

"Exception remains in the sovereign waters of Saudi Arabia.

"Regulation for shipping mentioned in the area will be reserved for pilgrim (refugee) ships by special markings."

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Germany's designation of the Red Sea as a war zone is not expected to alter President Roosevelt's recent proclamation the area is safe for American shipping.

While Mr. Roosevelt is required to proclaim combat zones around belligerent countries, he is only compelled to establish them elsewhere when actual danger exists.

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lying mission in a firm conviction Germany is unbeatable and it is futile for Britain to continue resistance.

This belief supplanted an earlier theory he flew to Britain because he feared Germany was headed for disaster, although some quarters still cling to this theory.

Nevertheless, many British quarters called the desertion of Hess a development "greater than a major victory on the battlefield."

The British said Hess may have been sickened by what he regarded as senseless slaughter and destruction—a despair which already has driven strong men to suicide in this war—but this must be placed in the category of speculation until further details are disclosed officially.

There were unconfirmed reports tonight Hess already had begun to "talk fully" but officials were silent as to whatever he may have told them.

Another fantastic touch was lent to the most bewildering episode of the whole war when it was revealed the young Duke of Hamilton, on whose Scottish estate Hess landed, had belonged to the now-condemned Anglo-German Fellowship association.

There remains a possibility, despite British denials, that Rudolf Hess may have been carrying actual peace proposals from Adolf Hitler on his fantastic flight to Scotland, according to a source acquainted with Hess and his role in the Nazi hierarchy.

Either that, it was speculated, or he became imbued with a fanatical and sincere conviction that an effort may be made immediately to end the war whatever the other Germans in power might believe.

All Guess-Work

But the "peace mission," intended to be secret, back-fired in a blaze of world-shaking publicity when Hess was compelled to leap by parachute and sprained his ankle, thereby forcing Hitler to repudiate the No. 3 Nazi as "insane" in order to save his own face, it was speculated.

Everything is guess-work at this stage of "Affaire Hess," however, and flaws and contradictions can be found in every theory so far advanced.

whose identity cannot be divulged, admitted that this theory was merely speculation based on a knowledge of Hess' character and personality.

It is equally plausible, he said, to believe that Hess decided to make this daring flight as the representative of a sincere and fearless Nazi group, which might even include No. 2 Nazi Reichsmarshal Hermann W. Goering, because it felt that he must make an effort to end the war.

Hess was said to be of a type who might believe that, in spite of Germany's military successes this far, the only salvation for Germany lay in making a deal with the British now.

Spiritual Struggle

Perhaps he underwent some great spiritual struggle with himself because of his unquestioned devotion to Hitler, deciding that he must make a supreme effort toward peace even if his action had the appearance of deserting and repudiating Hitler.

The United Press informant said he was convinced that Hess was neither insane, a traitor, nor that he ran away from a new Hitler blood purge like the one in which Hess himself helped wipe out Capt. Ernest Roehm and other Nazi party leaders.

Hess was the absolute confidence of Hitler, actually his shadow. No man in all Germany, not even Goering, was as close to Hitler as the tall-bushy-haired Hess.

Furthermore he held the confidence of many other Nazi bigwigs and was perhaps the one man in the upper Nazi brackets who enjoyed a reputation for decency and trustworthiness on all sides.

Adolf Hitler called all Reich leaders and district leaders of the Nazi party together today as the British declared a rift in the Nazi party was evidenced by the dramatic 800-mile escape flight of Rudolf Hess from Germany to Scotland, where he surrendered as a prisoner of war.

Pronounced sane by British doctors, Hess was quoted as saying when he parachuted to safety from his Messerschmitt fighting plane:

No Bombs

"I have no bombs in my plane, so you needn't worry."

The 47-year-old Nazi leader, Hitler's No. 2 heir to the German dictatorship, talked for 10 minutes to Scottish home guardsmen before he was taken to a military hospital on his arrival Saturday night.

liners." Thigpen said "We feel these will be accepted. The CAB has been denying applications which require more equipment and add route miles, and I presume that is the reason the Klamath Falls request was denied. It has been granting applications which do not involve more equipment or route miles, such as those at Eugene, Salem and Bellingham."

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Senator Lee (D-Ore.) said today the war department had informed him of selection of nine army cantonment sites to be used in event the army was expanded.

The senator was told the army was planning far in advance of its actual requirements to insure availability of sites in event they were needed.

It was explained no funds were available now for the cantonments and that the quartermaster general's office had been instructed to proceed with the advance planning exclusive of land acquisition and actual construction.

The sites, Lee said the war department advised him, included Santa Maria-Lompoc, Calif., and Medford and Eugene, Ore.

Each camp would be comprised of about 75,000 acres if established and would accommodate up to 35,000 troops.

Negro Killed In Second Try At Lynching

QUINCY, Ill., May 13 (AP)—A. C. Williams, 22-year-old negro charged with assaulting a 12-year-old white girl, was found shot to death today, several hours after a band of men seized him in a second lynching attempt when the first had failed.

"We found him on his back, where he apparently had been dropped by bullets fired into his body," Sheriff M. P. Luten said.

No arrests have been made in the case, and Sheriff Luten said "We have virtually no clues to work on."

The first lynching attempt came in the evening when four white men armed with pistols locked Officer Dan Davis in a cell at the Gadsden county jail and took Williams with them.

Williams was found shortly after midnight at a negro residence near here, Sheriff Luten said, "with eight or ten bullet wounds in his body" and badly beaten about the head.

Luten said "undoubtedly an attempt was made to lynch him" and his attackers left him for dead. A physician here said Williams had a fairly good chance to recover so the prisoner was put in an ambulance to be taken to a hospital at Tallahassee, about 25 miles west of Quincy.

County Court Approves List Road Projects

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rill, government corner south to Southern Pacific depot, 1.5 miles; Shasta way to Madison, 1 mile; Homedale road, 1 mile; Harlan drive, 3 miles; Etna street, 3 miles; Kesterson road, 1 mile; total, 7 miles.

Cities and residents involved in the proposed oiling projects will be asked to contribute to the fund, according to County Judge U. E. Reeder.

Replacing bridges throughout the county has also been included in the 1941 tentative program. Bridges included are as follows: Weed canal, irrigation canal, and Annie Creek, all near Fort Klamath; Sprague river at Bonanza; Lost River at Harpold dam; canal by U. E. Reeder's ranch; two bridges over Van Brimmer ditch on roads to Merrill; at least 10, one and two-span bridges over irrigation ditches.

Bridge construction this year may meet with a little difficulty due to scarcity of structural lumber, it was reported by County Engineer Howard. The bridge program may have to be cut to suit the county's pocketbook, County Judge Reeder observed, due to the increased price in building materials.

All work suggested to the court by the engineer is stressed as a tentative program.

"The court will do as much as the budget allows," Judge Reeder stated.

U. S. SELECTS NETTED GEMS

Government officials hope to continue the use of last year's output until June before they start in on the new crop. All local potatoes used are Netted Gems, it was learned. The army and navy orders this season have been a boon to potato growers as several hundred carloads have been shipped out this season, many to cantonments at Camp Lewis and Vancouver, Wash., and to California points.

The better stock is selling around 90 cents per 100 pounds to the growers, and "not so good" stock comes a little lower, it was learned from Aubrey.
