WAR, LABOR NEWS BLOCKS STOCK RALLY

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)— Bearish implications of war and labor news from Wall Street's angle today received the principal blame for turning a mild early stock market rally into a retreat.

Transfers were around 450,000 shares. Union controversies in the automotive, shipping and coal fields, and threats of a nearby railway wage battle, helped chill sentiment, brokers said. In addition, bulletins from European sectors, including the persistent mystery of the Hess flight from Germany, served to revive nervousness among speculative forces. A fairly good business news budget was bolstering for individual stocks but ignored elsewhere.

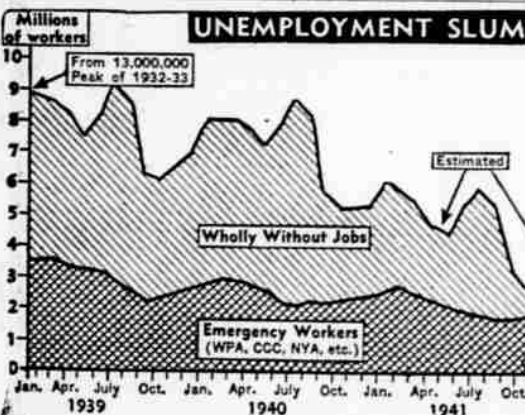

WHEAT SLIPS AFTER HITTING NEW PEAKS

CHICAGO, May 13 (AP)— Wheat prices tumbled about two cents a bushel today after reaching new 12-month peaks early in the session.

Profit taking caused the reaction which was regarded largely as technical in view of yesterday's sharp upswing culminating a rise of about 10 cents a bushel in the past two weeks.

The market encountered some support at times in the form of buying associated with brisk flour business. Profit taking was encouraged by increased sales of wheat at some terminals, favorable crop reports, and advices pointing out that Canadian wheat is near an import basis because of high domestic prices.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c lower than yesterday, May 99c, July 98 1/8c; corn 14-1/4c lower, May 71 1/2c, July 72c; oats 8-1/4c down.
