

FIRE PERMITS NOW REQUIRED FOR BURNING

Thursday, May 15, marked the opening of the fire season and it was announced here that permits will be necessary for any burning on forest land or on land where fire might move into forest land.

Permits may be obtained from the state district ranger at the Klamath Forest Protective offices, 340 Conger avenue.

The Forest Protective association was rushing final preparations for the summer season, and it was expected lookouts will be sent to their mountain-top posts in a few days.

Crews are busy on roads and telephone lines.

Officials of the association said that a study of fires for the last 10 years shows that 99 per cent of the timber loss in this area resulted from man-made fires, and approximately 1 per cent from lightning fires.

STORES ASSAIL SMALL PAYMENTS

Senate Committee Hears Bridges Tried To Obtain Files

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—Testimony that Harry Bridges, west coast labor leader, tried to obtain confidential government files to thwart efforts to deport him as an alien was on file today with a senate subcommittee.

The testimony came from Major Lemuel B. Schofield, in charge of the immigration and naturalization service.

The justice department official, recently returned from the Bridges deportation hearing in San Francisco, told a senate judiciary subcommittee that Bridges' request for access to the records was denied by a federal judge but that proposed legislation might force disclosure of similar confidential information in future cases.

Major Schofield testified that the request by Bridges, who faces deportation charges under a new alien registration law, was "made ostensibly to enable the alien to investigate in advance the witnesses who were to be called against him to check on their statements in an effort to bolster the contention that the evidence was in a large respect untrustworthy and manufactured." But Schofield told senators that officials here "are positively convinced that the real purpose was for the alien (Bridges) to concoct false alibis, false testimony, and endeavor, falsely and corruptly to meet the evidence that was fairly presented against him."

Interior Department Bill Goes to Senate After House Vote

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—The interior department appropriation bill, carrying appropriations of \$78,934,000 for western reclamation projects and \$22,858,500 for the Bonneville power administration, was on the way to the senate today after house passage.

Repeated efforts by minority members to trim individual items, culminating late yesterday in a motion by Representative Jones (R-Ohio) to send the measure back to committee with instructions to reduce the total by \$21,489,245 or to approximately the amount allowed the department the current fiscal year, were beaten down.

The standing vote, as announced by Speaker Rayburn, was 104 to 76.

Large items included \$31,839,488 for the bureau of Indian affairs, \$14,466,775 for the park service, \$7,791,175 for the fish and wildlife service and \$1,459,

465 for administration of territorial affairs. The bill now carries \$21,477,245 more than the current year's appropriations, but \$6,317,270 less than the amount recommended by the budget bureau.

CROSS-EXAMINATION OF EMPLOYER ENDS

Completion of the cross examination of L. D. Hoesley, head of the logging firm charged with unfair labor practices, and re-direct examination of the burly, mahogany-faced logger featured the morning session of the national labor relations board hearing Thursday in the city hall.

Hoesley, whose company is accused of interference in union activities, maintaining a company union, and discharging six employees for rival union work, took the stand Wednesday as the first of the respondent's witnesses. Questioning by John B. Ebinger, Hoesley attorney, occupied most of Wednesday during which time the logger stated some of the men were discharged for failure to obey logging rules, while two others left for medical treatment.

Cross examination was done by William A. Babcock, NLRB attorney, and the Industrial Employees union representatives, J. G. Wolf and E. H. Card. Chet Masters, Hoesley time-keeper, was called to testify shortly before the noon recess Thursday and was under questioning during the afternoon.
