## REVIVAL MEETING IN PROGRESS HERE

An old-fashioned revival meeting is now being held in the white tent just off of South Sixth street on the corner of Mitchell and Shasta way. Evangelist Charles G. Meyers, with a party of southern young people from the Apostolic Bible school in Bradenton, Fla., is conducting these special revival services.

The services begin each evening at 7:30 o'clock with spiritual, instrumental music rendered by a group of young talented musicians. ### Give Your Sunday Budget Meals That 'Extra' Touch of Flavor

Budget meals for Sunday need a little extra flavor. These three low-cost recipes have it!

**Lamb Patties with Curried Pineapple**  
(Serves 4 to 6)  
One pound ground breast or shank of lamb, 1 teaspoon chopped onion, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, 1½ teaspoons salt, ½ teaspoon pepper.

Mix all ingredients together. Form into patties and saute on both sides. Serve with curried pineapple.

**Curried Pineapple**  
Four tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons curry powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cups canned pineapple, cut in cubes, 1 cup pineapple juice.

Melt butter and blend with curry powder and salt. Add pineapple and juice. Simmer about 15 minutes until pineapple absorbs flavor.

**Chicken Casserole Spanish Style**  
(Serves 4 to 6)  
Three and one-half pounds frying chicken, salt, pepper, flour, 4 tablespoons olive oil or cooking fat, 1 small onion, chopped, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, ¼ cup chopped celery, 1½ cups tomato juice, 1-3 cup sliced ripe olives.

Cut the chicken in pieces for serving, sprinkle with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Brown in the olive oil or fat and remove to a casserole. Brown the chopped onion and green pepper lightly in the remaining fat, add the carrot, celery and tomato juice and season with salt and pepper. Add to the chicken, cover the casserole and bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F) for about an hour or until the chicken is tender. Add a little water, if needed, while the chicken is cooking. A few minutes before the chicken is removed from the oven, add the olives.
