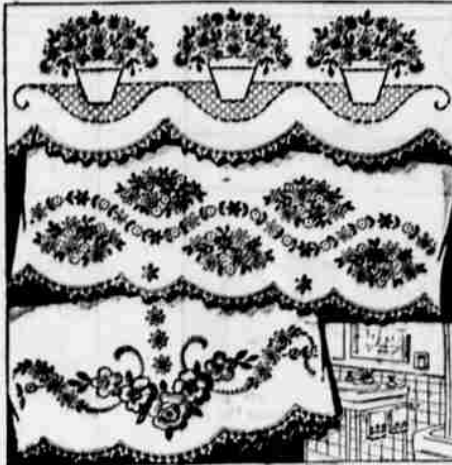

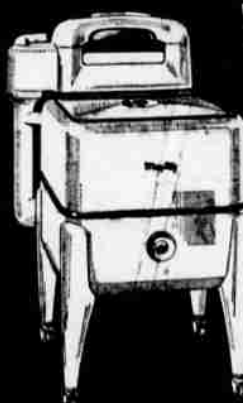

TROOP MOVE REACHES HERE ON WEDNESDAY

A small advance force will arrive here Tuesday ahead of the movement of nearly 10,000 troops through here beginning on Wednesday.

On Wednesday, Thursday,

Friday and Saturday nights, the troops will make camp at a site on Hauser Construction company property on Cumberland road, near the animal shelter and the old Great Northern roundhouse in West Klamath.

The 41st division of national guard troops is making the movement through here, on the way from Fort Lewis, Wash., to San Francisco, Calif., for maneuvers.

The division will make stops at Vancouver, Bend and Klamath Falls. The units are from 213 to 408 vehicles each. Largest group is expected Thursday night, when 2500 men will camp here.

Motorists were warned that

the motor convoys will have right-of-way over civilian traffic and private trips should be planned in advance to avoid the military groups.

These units frequently are spaced far enough apart to allow civilian motorists to pass, but extreme care must be used.

Military convoys going through cities, if escorted by city police, may frequently move through stop lights and stop signs without halting. Motorists should never attempt to break through such a column or drive alongside. The Motor association advised civilian drivers to pull well off to one side of the street and let military

convoys pass under these conditions.

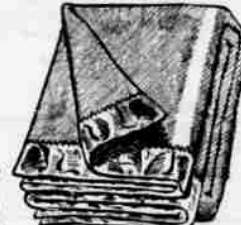
