Softball Fete Carded

Ceremonies Will Mark Opening Monday, June 2

Inaugural ceremonies marking the official opening of the 1941 softball season will be staged Monday, June 2, at Recreation park with a series of exhibition encounters involving most of the 14 teams expected to be ready for the summer's activity. Tuesday, June 3, was erroneously announced as the evening of initial action in a story last week.

Plans of Klamath Softball association directors call for a parade of all softball players, managers and sponsors down Main street preceding the Monday exhibition. City and county officials together with league directors are expected to be on hand to dedicate the 1941 season for the more than 150 young men expected to be involved in this year's program.

Estlin Kiger, secretary-treasurer of the league, announced Saturday that the Eagles lodge, tentative entry, had definitely withdrawn its application for membership in the circuit. However, Big Lakes Lumber and Box, a strong team in the 1940 Klamath "B" league, will surely be represented in this year's pennant race. The name of the Big Lakes nine was omitted from the list of 1941 entries published last week.

Thirteen clubs are now registered to be included in the chase to determine the 1941 championship, currently held by the Knights of Columbus outfit. Final rosters and entry fees are to be filed with Kiger or Dave Bridge at the city recreation office not later than Monday, May 26.

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Powerful Trojans Win Ninth West Coast Relays Crown

FRESNO, Calif., May 19 (UP)—The Trojans from the University of Southern California Saturday night won their ninth west coast relays championship with 804 points.

California was second with 534 points and Stanford third with 27.

The smashing win further established the national champion Trojans as the best track team in the nation. Robert Peoples paced the USC team with a javelin throw of 234 feet 11 inches, the best toss ever made by an American. He held the former mark at 234 feet 11 inches.

Wind Hampers Performance At Grade School Tourney

A cold day with plenty of north wind spoiled what had promised to be an outstanding track and field meet when the outstanding athletes of the seven city elementary schools met for their annual event at Modoc field Saturday.

Despite the chilling weather four outstanding performances were turned in, though no records were broken. Junior Spetz, midwest star of a surprising Fairview team, turned in a 7 1/2 second 50 yard dash and came one-half inch short of the standing broad jump record for "C" class boys. "Hank" Schortgen, Mills' one-man team, scored a broad jump of 18 feet 3 inches in the "A" event. Dannie Derrah, Fremont peewee enter, threw the baseball 132 feet 1 inch in the "C" event.

Fremont claimed the top team honors with a total of 57 points. Fairview was a strong second with 50 1/2, with Mills with 21 points followed closely by Fairview with 17. Fremont piled up a huge score in the "B" meet with 20 points (a first in every event) with Fairview again second on ten counters. Fairview claimed tops in the "C" events with 23 1/2 points in 16 for Fremont.

Cold Checks Two Pelican Ball Games

Sleet Pops Lights as Redding Leads Saturday Tilt; Haynes Injured

Cold weather, with a penetrating wind and some sleet thrown in, forced cancellation of two practice contests for the Klamath Falls Pelicans against Redding and Mt. Shasta of the Northern California league over the weekend.

An attempt to play the Redding game Saturday night was foiled in the fourth inning when a driving sleet whipped against the hot lamps on the northeast side of the field and popped eight of them in rapid succession. The game was called with the Redding nine leading, 5-0, but went as no contest since less than the required four and one-half innings had been played.

Manager Red Sanders expressed a firm conviction before the Saturday tussle got underway that the cold weather might be detrimental to his team's chances for victory in league play with possible sore arms resulting from throwing too hard under such unsatisfactory conditions. Such an unfortunate accident occurred in the third inning of the Redding tilt when Virg Haynes, twirling for the Pelicans, injured his arm and was relieved by Clyde Carlstrom who worked the fourth frame.

The scheduled Sunday game with Mt. Shasta Athletic club was called off early Sunday morning when it was discovered that the cold wind had not abated in the least. League di-

WSC Captures 9th Coast Track Title

Steers Surprises Crowd With Long Javelin Heave Besides High Jump

PULLMAN, Wash., May 19 (UP)—Washington State college's well-balanced squad today captured its ninth consecutive northern division Pacific coast conference track and field title, scoring 48 2-5 points in the division championships on Rogers field.

University of Washington finished second, with 33 1-5 points, followed by University of Idaho, 30 2-5; University of Oregon, 26 1-10; Oregon State college, 16 2-5; and Montana State university 10 1.

Les Steers, Oregon's talented high jumper and holder of the unofficial world's record in his specialty, set a new meet record of 6 feet 8 13-16 inches. He cleared the height with ease but was prevented by a knee injury from any attempts to beat his best mark of 6 feet 10 23-32 inches.

Steers and Pat Haley, lanky WSC sophomore, were the meet's individual stars. In addition to the high jump, Steers surprised the experts with a first in the javelin with a throw of 205 feet 7-8 inches. Haley took three first places—the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the 220-yard low hurdles.

Performances were only fair. The meet, scheduled for Saturday, was put over two days when rain made the field unfit for use.

Surprise of the meet was Idaho's showing. The Vandals took three firsts, although Phil Leibowitz, one of the west's ranking distance men, contented himself with but one first, in the mile.

Four Moundsmen Hurl 4-Hit Games

Reds Defeat Braves, 7-3; Browns Beat Yanks, 5-1; A's Take Indians

Pitching in the major leagues reached one of the season's most effective levels Monday when four moundsmen each fashioned four-hit triumphs and two checked in with nine-hit victories.

One of the victorious pitchers—Johnny Vander Meer of the Cincinnati Reds—failed to go the route, although his club, with relief help by Joe Beggs, beat the Boston Braves, 7-3.

A total of 44 hits were given up by the eight pitchers employed in Monday's winning efforts for an average of six hits per nine-inning task. Broken down, the figures showed that four pitchers in the American league allowed a total of 27 hits of 6.5 for each nine innings while the National league—with only three games scheduled—saw four pitchers give up 17 hits for a 5-5 nine-inning average.

Errors Pave Way
Denny Galehouse held the New York Yankees to four hits. Errors by Joe Gordon and Frankie Crosetti paved the way for the St. Louis Browns' 5-1 victory. Galehouse, who pitched a one-hit game against Washington his last time out, held the Yanks hitless until Crosetti singled in the sixth.

Johnny Gorsica set the Boston Red Sox down in order in six innings as the Detroit Tigers scored a 4-2 triumph behind his four-hit hurling. Gorsica allowed only one hit going into the seventh when Lou Finney singled and scored on Ted Williams' long homer.

The Philadelphia Athletics pummeled two pitchers for 12 hits and defeated the league-leading Cleveland Indians, 5-4 for the second straight time. Les McCrabb held the Indians to nine hits including a homer by Al Milnar in the south with one on.

White Sox Win
Ed Smith of the Chicago White Sox gave up only 10 hits as his team defeated the Washington Senators, 8-2.

The Chicago Cubs belted out a 14-1 triumph over Brooklyn and knocked the Dodgers into second place as Claude Paszau allowed only four hits. Brooklyn has now lost three straight and trails the St. Louis Cardinals by .004 percentage points.

Max Butcher stopped the New York Giants with four hits as the Pittsburgh Pirates whacked out a 2-1 victory. Bob Elliott's double and Elbie Fletcher's single drove home the winning run.

Cincinnati moved into a fifth-place tie with Boston as Vander Meer won his third game.

The Cardinals and Philadelphia Phillies were unscheduled.

San Diego won yesterday's opener from Los Angeles, 4-3, on Wally Hebert's seven-hit pitching, but Julio Bonetti clinched the series for the Angels in the nightcap, 5-2. It was the righthander's fifth victory of the year against no defeats and installed him as the league's No. 1 hurler.
