

SNYDER TALKS AMERICANISM AT CEREMONY

SILVER LAKE — B. K. Snyder, of Lakeview, state representative from Lake and Deschutes counties, spoke on the subject, "Americanism," to the graduates of Silver Lake high school and a large audience here Friday night.

"Our heritage as a free people under a democratic form of government is our most priceless possession," said Snyder. "That possession, now menaced as never before by despotism, we must defend with every means in our power, even at the sacrifice of life itself," he told the graduates.

"The last 50 years have been the most marvelous in the advancement of science that the world has known," he continued. "Today even the poorest people in America have comforts and conveniences unknown to the rich half a century ago because they had not yet been imagined. Yet the next 50 years will be more wonderful, more tempestuous and more glorious, if we make them so, than any period of history."

Speaking of the immortality of human influence upon other lives, Snyder paid tribute to the late Dr. Bernard Daly, Lake country's greatest citizen. Dr. Daly came to Lakeview an obscure young doctor with few assets except his professional skill and his business ability.

When he died he left a fortune for the education of Lake county youth. Through these hundreds of young people which he has helped to an education Dr. Daly's influence is reaching today to every corner of the United States. Former Daly fund students are doctors in Washington, D. C., and teachers in universities in various states.

Dr. Daly was, as every great American has been, an ardent champion of democracy and a tireless defender of Americanism, Snyder said.

MERRILL MEN AID MOOSE IN REMODEL JOB

MALIN — Ray Van Meter, Oregon state inside guardian of the Loyol Order of Moose, and other members of the Merrill lodge are contributing voluntary labor on the building near Tenth and Pine streets, Klamath Falls, that is being remodeled for use as a Moose hall by the Klamath Falls lodge.

Purchased recently from A. M. Collier and Lloyd Porter of the Klamath Falls branch of the First National bank of Portland, the building is one of the first erected in Klamath Falls and was the first home of the Hirvi bakery.

Two floors of the building will be completed soon at an approximate cost of \$4000 with furnishings to cost an equal amount. Later, a full basement will be added to be used as a dining room and kitchen. Partitions have been removed to allow for spacious lodge rooms, recreation rooms and a lounge, locker rooms and rest rooms, the entire interior to be remodeled and decorated and the brick exterior will be coated with white stucco.

A patio and landscaped grounds with a parking lot at the rear for the use of members and guests is planned and when completed will be one of the most modern and luxurious lodge rooms in the city. The rooms will be used only by the Loyol Order of Moose and affiliated organizations.

Members of the Klamath basin, interested in assisting with the building have met evenings since wrecking operations started to help with the rough work and "potluck" has been served by Women of the Moose to those assisting. A turkey dinner was served to about 30 volunteers last Saturday at noon. Experienced labor is recruited from among Klamath Falls tradesmen.
