

PLANS OF NEW CANTONMENTS TO BE DRAWN

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Contracts for advance plans for nine new camp sites which eventually may be constructed to house that number of streamlined army triangular divisions were awarded yesterday by the war department.

The army said the contracts were merely for architectural and engineering services, to provide layouts for eventual construction of the big cantonments, costing about \$23,000,000 each, should congress later authorize their building and appropriate the necessary funds.

Amounts of the engineering and architectural fees were not stated.

The advance layouts were ordered, it was said, as a preparation "against any emergency which may necessitate additional increase in the strength of the army."

Among the sites and the firms to which awards were made, were:

Eugene, Ore.—John W. Cunningham and associates, and Lawrence and Allyn, Portland, Ore.

Medford, Ore.—Myron Hunt and H. C. Chambers, Los Angeles, and Blackie and Wood, San Francisco.

PORTLAND, May 23 (AP)—The state highway commission discussed problems today which may arise if the army builds a projected cantonment near Medford and opened bids on projects in six counties totaling \$655,000.

The commission took no action on the suggestion of Paul Rynning, Jackson county engineer, that proposed improvement of the Crater Lake highway from Medford to seven miles north would be inadequate if the army builds a cantonment there. Because of uncertainty that it will be built, and the possibility that federal funds would be available, the commission decided to inspect the highway but to await a decision before acting.

A request of Pierce Auto Freight Lines for a permit to haul overloads of defense material from Medford to the state line was rejected. Action of the legislature in refusing to boost the load limit made granting the request impossible, the commission said.

Antique Sewing Machine Owned By Merrill Woman

MERRILL.—A sewing machine bought in 1865 that still sews is owned by Mrs. Willard L. Smith of Merrill and it is possible that it is the only one of its kind in Klamath county.

In 1865, Mrs. Mary Stone, mother of Mrs. Smith and of Mrs. P. Hinkley, Klamath Falls went to The Dalles from her home in Canyon City, bought a new Wheeler and Wilson machine and later made sacks for the grist mill, first one at Canyon City, for her father, A. R. McCallum, who also built the first hotel in the town. Family sewing also for many years was done on the same machine and the stitching on garments was even and fine.

Curved needles were used and of the original dozen that came with the machine four remain as do all the extra tools and equipment. The original leather belt, about an inch wide, is also in place.

Cloth was fed beneath the

needle on a raised platform, the garment moving from left to right. Feet of the operator fitted into two shoe shaped pieces of metal for the pedal and the "foot" through which the thread was fed is of glass. Five of the original round flat bobbins about the size of a 50-cent piece are also in the equipment box with a stone which Mrs. Stone sharpened her needles.

The Wheeler and Wilson company was sold many years ago to the Singer company for the patent on the bobbin when the old long bobbin used by the Singer company was found to be out of date.

The machine was used by the family until 1920, Mrs. Smith states, and in proof of its reliability even though it produced hundreds of grist sacks, Mrs. Smith exhibited several old fashioned dresses made by her mother on the machine when she was very small.

SENATE ACTION ON PHOTO BAN LOOMS

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Members said today the senate naval committee probably would act finally next week on legislation providing fines and jail sentences for persons who take forbidden pictures of American naval equipment or of foreign war vessels being repaired in the United States.

The committee agreed yesterday to delay action temporarily after Senator Johnson (R-Calif.) had contended the bill would allow the secretary of the navy to issue regulations which would amount to "penal statutes." It also would permit prosecution of "absolutely innocent persons," Johnson said.

Originally, the bill would have provided jail sentences up to a year and fines up to \$1000 but a naval subcommittee recommended penalties be reduced to a maximum of six months in jail and a maximum \$500 fine.

Naval Commander J. H. Fossitt told the committee the navy's intention was to "prosecute those who in opposition to regulations continue to take photographs and publish photographs."

NAVY MAN SEES LOSS FOR BRITISH

SHANGHAI, May 23 (AP)—Rear Admiral William Glassford, commander of the United States Yangtze naval patrol, declared Thursday night that the battle of the Atlantic "at this moment is being lost by the allies."

"We are not only facing inevitable defeat of England and collapse of the British empire but also defeat of the United States unless something is done," he added.

Glassford told an audience of Chinese and American business men here that something must be done "to stop the sinking of allied ships in the Atlantic, which are going on faster than they can be replaced."

"Once again," he declared, "it is the United States' job to save England."

"This means ships."

"Once again we are asked to build a colossal merchant marine to carry war supplies to England. We shall do it. But if it is not evident soon, this will not be enough. These ships must get safely across the Atlantic." Referring to the possibility of convoys, the admiral said, "This is the one real and deadly effective solution, but just how we are to insure safe passage of the Atlantic remains to be seen."
