

BOEING PLANT SCENE OF CIO, AFL CAMPAIGN

SEATTLE, May 27 (AP)—Gates of the main Boeing Aircraft company plant loomed today as a potential trouble scene in the CIO's determined drive to lure the workmen away from the AFL's Aeronautical Mechanics' union.

In defiance of an edict of the mayor and police chief, spokesmen for the United Auto Workers' union said a large CIO force would accompany leaflet distributors to the plant at the change of shifts in late afternoon.

Harvey Jackins, acting leader of the CIO group, said a force of 2000 CIO men would be mobilized outside the Boeing gates.

Mayor Earl Millikin and Police Chief William Sears banned CIO activity at the plant gates after eggs and fists flew a week ago at the appearance of the union campaigners with their sound truck. The Boeing company has a union shop agreement with the AFL's Aeronautical Mechanics' union.

Mayor Millikin declared after a conference yesterday with the CIO leaders and representatives of law enforcement officers:

"We informed them that we aren't interested in whether the CIO or the American Federation of Labor is recognized as the bargaining agency at Boeing's. We made it clear that our only concern is to prevent disorder, rioting and possible bloodshed."

Jackins charged that city officials were trying to "deny the workers the right to organize by denying them their civil liberties of freedom of assembly."

Jackins said the decision to send 2000 men was made after the mayor failed to reply to an offer to send only 20 pamphlet distributors if the mayor would guarantee police protection and the arrest of disturbers of the peace.

Jackins was one of the numerous members of the AFL union who were expelled during recent international union "trials" on charges of encouraging dual unionism. Several others were expelled as the result of a union trial board's hearings on charges of communistic activity within the union.

ALGOMA RUNOFF ELECTION SLATED

A National Labor Relations board runoff election for 254 employees of the Algoma Lumber company mill will be held within the next three weeks, according to Joe Boyd, AFL organizer.

A board election recently held at the mill resulted in 92 votes being cast for the CIO, 85 for the AFL and 59 for no union.

An NLRB order specified the runoff ballot must be held within 30 days of May 22.

MOOSEHEART CITY TO GRADUATE 72

P. L. White, governor and W. C. Hooper, secretary of Klamath Falls Moose lodge No. 1106, together with the board of officers and committeemen announce that they will join with all other units of the Moose fraternity in adopting a large class of candidates as a testimonial to the 72 students who will graduate on June 14 from the famous Moose City of Childhood located at Mooseheart, Ill.

The graduating class this year comprises 47 boys and 25 girls, all sons and daughters of deceased members of the Loyal Order of Moose. Some of these young men and women on graduating from Mooseheart will leave the only hope some of them have ever known, ready to take their places in the world as good and useful members of modern society. Their education, training and welfare has been given to them at the famous child city through the assistance of the almost one half million members of the Loyal Order of Moose.

The members of this year's graduating class hail from 25 states and one Canadian province, and represent the 23rd group to be graduating from Mooseheart since 1919 when the original class of five boys completed their training there. Since that time 1535 boys and girls, all orphaned through the death of their fathers, have been graduated. The average time of residence at the child city for these youngsters has been 10 years and four months, and the average age at graduation is 18 years and three months. During their stay at Mooseheart each child is equipped with a high school education and is taught proficiency in one or more of the 23 practical trades taught there.
