PIERCE CITES WAR EFFECT ON WHEAT

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Rep. Pierce (D-Ore.) warned that wheat farmers "can no longer ignore the seriousness of the world situation" as it relates to their crop, and urged Oregon growers to vote May 31 to establish quotas under the agricultural adjustment act.

"Many wheat farmers do not realize, perhaps, how much they have been sheltered by the wheat program from the depressed world wheat situation," he declared in a statement, in which he said more than 6500 wheat producers of his state were expected to vote May 31 on the question of establishing wheat quotas under the AAA.

"In the nation approximately 700,000 wheat producers are expected to vote, and if two-thirds of those voting approve, market quotas will become effective," he said.

"If quotas are disapproved, farmers will face the probability of greatly decreased prices for their wheat, because the AAA wheat program—particularly the loan—is holding the domestic wheat price above the world level.

"American wheat farmers cannot afford to leave themselves at the mercy of a world market that will take only one bushel of wheat for every three offered. Full application of the farm program is the only thing that stands between us and the kind of emergency that exists in other western hemisphere countries that have suffered heavy losses in agricultural exports.

"Approval of the quota will enable farmers to keep part of the surplus in storage and off the market. The quota makes it possible to use the government loan as a price support."

More Openings in Sheetmetal Class

UNITED PLANS EXCEPTIONS IN KLAMATH CASE

United Airlines informed the chamber of commerce Wednesday that it is filing exceptions to the examiner's recommendations to the civil aeronautics board on the question of United service into Klamath Falls.

The examiners were unfavorable to the application of United for service here, but their report is yet to be considered by the CAB.

United not only will file exceptions, but will prepare briefs in support of its exceptions, the chamber was informed.

Meanwhile, local efforts went forward to save the United application. Mayor John Houston and the city council forwarded a resolution by the council setting forth the city's need for airline service and citing the expenditures being made here to bring the municipal airport up to standards to accommodate the equipment of a large airline.

The chamber of commerce has taken similar action.

A report on progress of new wage scale negotiations will be delivered to Klamath members of the Culinary alliance at two special meetings Thursday, G. C. Tatman announced Wednesday.

The AFL alliance is currently demanding a 50 cent per day wage boost across the board for all cooks, waitresses, dishwashers and bartenders employed in some 80 local eating establishments. A deadline of June 1 has been set on the demands.
