Germans Deny Death of Max Schmeling

(Continued from Page One) possible the landing of reinforcements. Schmeling has not been wounded, and his condition is not serious, the nazis said.

Schmeling's death was reported in Alexandria, Egypt, on Wednesday by reliable British sources.

British field ambulance men said Schmeling had been wounded slightly in the first days of the battle of Crete. After being taken to a dressing station, he was sent back to a prison camp, they said, and was killed when he seized a rifle and attempted to escape.

Military officers, including a colonel, investigated personally when Schmeling was captured and satisfied themselves beyond doubt of his identity, the Alexandria dispatch said.

(Continued from Page One) plane, tank and munitions factory in Germany, the breeding ground for war."

Norris, only remaining senator to vote against American entry into the World War, said he agreed with Anthony Eden's peace proposals but believes the most important is that which would "guarantee that this starvation and suffering is never again visited upon the world."

Complete destruction of Germany's military machine and capacity to produce the lethal weapons of war is an absolutely indispensable prelude to any lasting peace, Norris contended.

Guns Set Up at Airplane Plant

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 29 (AP)—Four anti-aircraft guns and a detachment of soldiers of the 218th coast artillery were stationed at the \$20,000,000 Consolidated Aircraft Corp. plant today.

Army officers said the soldiers would be on 24-hour duty behind the guns for an indefinite period.

Although the mounting of three of the guns on the roof of the huge plant and one near the street in front of the building was described officially as an anti-aircraft practice project, the army said there would be no firing.

Consolidated is engaged on a \$500,000,000 backlog, producing flying boats and land bombers for Great Britain and the U. S. army and navy.

KAISER ILL

AMSTERDAM, German-Occupied Netherlands, May 29 (AP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany, 82, was reported today to have been ill for several weeks in his refuge in the Netherlands. His major domo declined, however, to answer all questions concerning the seriousness of his illness.

British service. He advocated priorities on materials used in making pipe lines and oil tankers, to hasten their construction. Ickes said an effort to build the pipe lines had been blocked in the Georgia legislature by the railroads "very shortsightedly."

T. R. Tate, of the federal power commission, told of the study to conserve power.

Tate expressed hope, however, that any restriction in the use of electricity would not include the "lightless nights" and darkened great white ways of World War years.

Under the "unlimited emergency" proclaimed Tuesday night, President Roosevelt has absolute sway over the nation's power facilities. He may "take over power houses, dams, conduits and reservoirs, require temporary conversions of facilities and such interchange, delivery and transmission as may be required."

high level bombers, insufficient machine guns to answer the terrific fire power on individual paratroopers who are walking armaments, and insufficient air power to match the Luftwaffe.

Islanders of Crete, including school boys of 12 and 13, were reported fighting side by side

with trained troops, using weapons which they had taken from the bodies of thousands of slain Germans.

It was estimated here the Germans were using 1,200 large troop transport planes on a regular schedule between Greece and Crete. Sometimes the planes were landing at the rate of one a minute, reports said.
