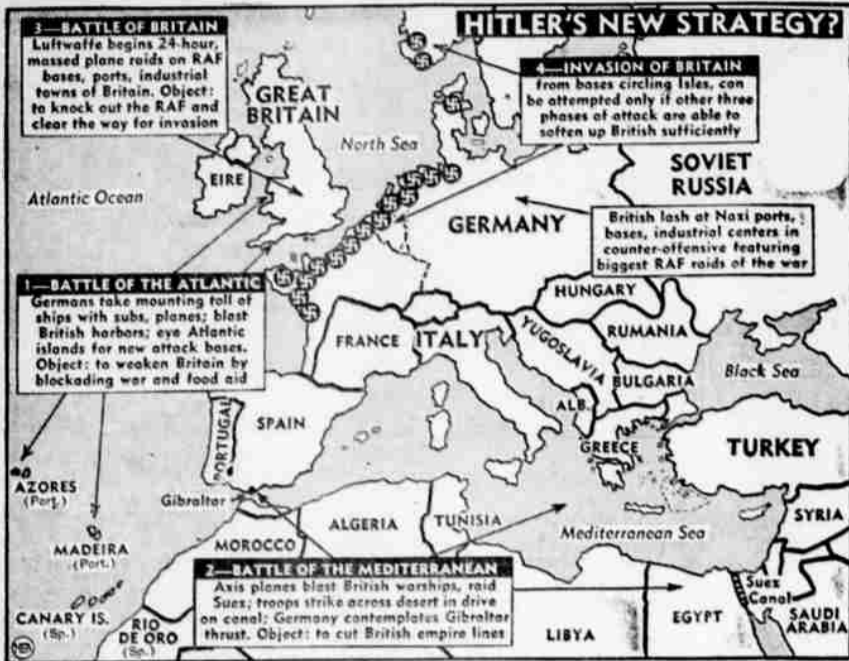
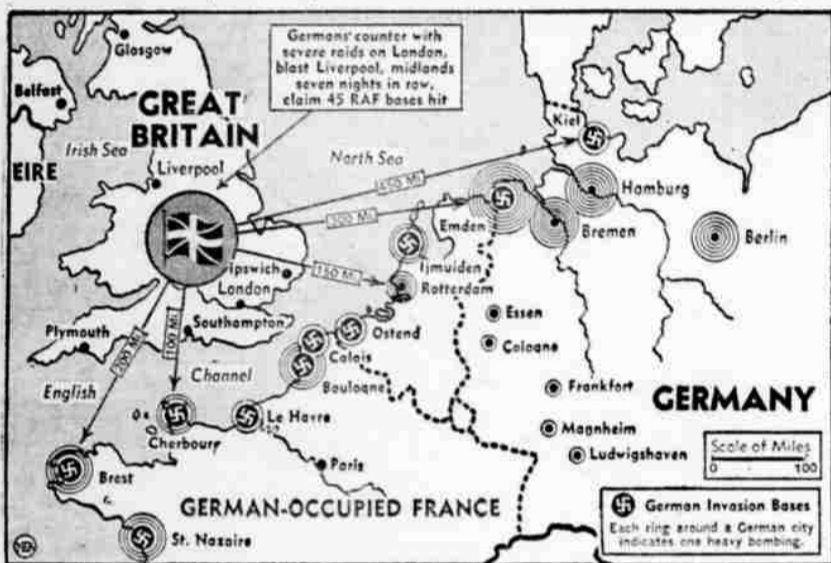

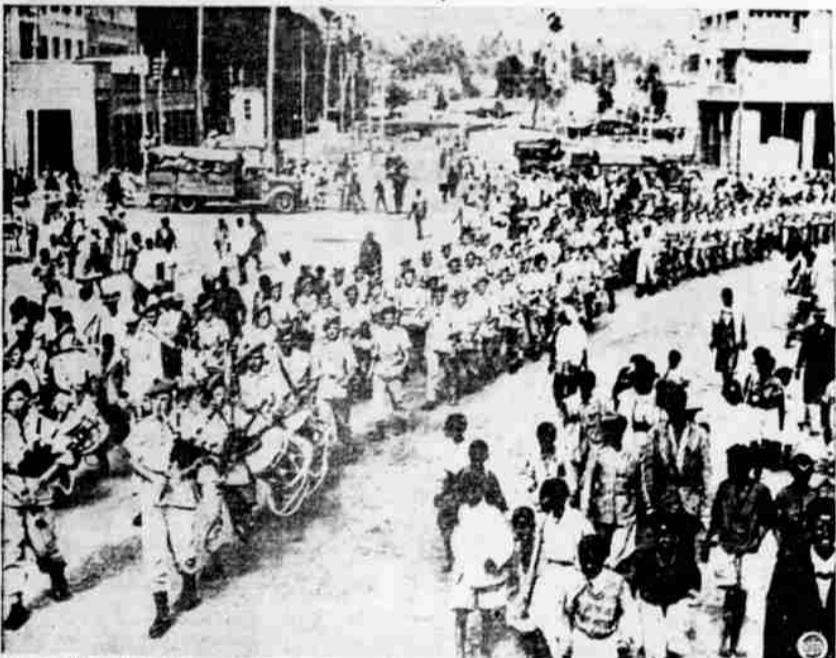

RAF Dumps May Basket of Bombs on Germany.



Maytime in Britain finds hundreds of RAF bombers swinging into the sky nightly for devastating attacks on German bases, ports and industrial centers in answer to Nazi raids on British cities. Map shows points in Germany hit heavily in half-a-month of raids, with distances from England.

British Roll Into Ethiopian Capital After Forced March



Drums roll and pipes skirl as soldiers of a Transvaal regiment march into Addis Ababa. The British troops entered the Ethiopian capital after advancing 1900 miles in less than two months.

Germans Fall Prisoners to British in Egypt Fighting

Japanese Ruler's Daughter to Wed



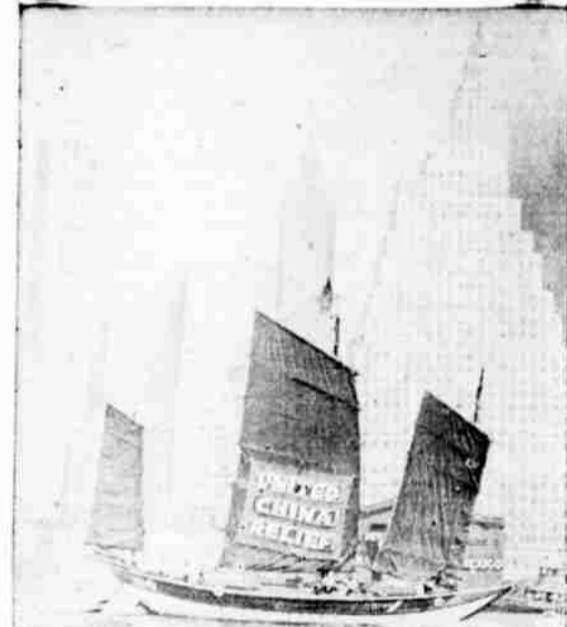

14 Years of Air Progress: Spirit of St. Louis to Super Bomber



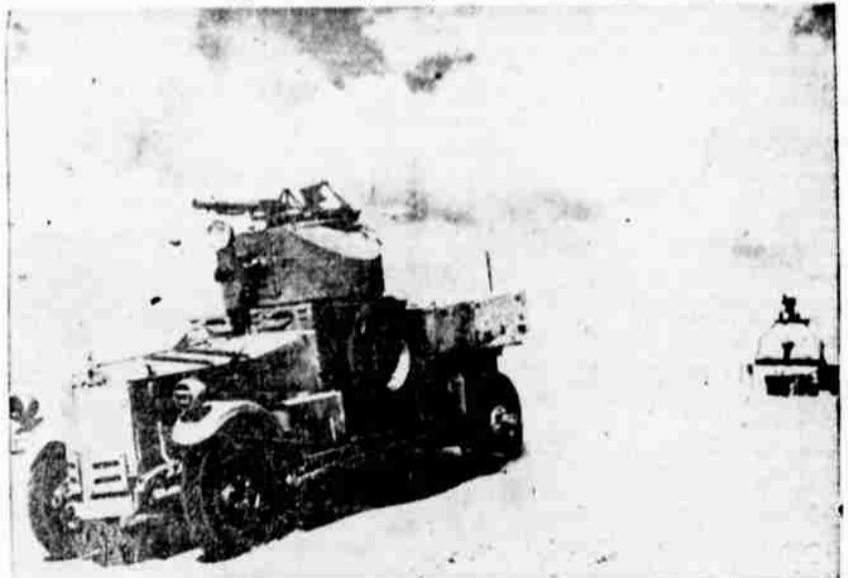
Just 14 years to the month after Charles Lindbergh made his historic non-stop flight to Paris in the Spirit of St. Louis, the U. S. Army's B-19 super bomber is getting its first tests. Pictorial shows how the monoplane of 1927 compares with the giant four-motored bomber of 1941. B-19 could make flight Lindbergh made, and come back again without stopping.

'Old Glory' Fails to Save U. S. Goods From Japanese Seizure



Warehouse of the North American syndicate at Haiphong, French Indo-China, one of two American companies broken into by Japanese who seized 10 million dollars' worth of official American goods. Japan officially declared it did not recognize either company as American undertakings, but "binds" for the Chinese Government.

British Gaining in Iraq, Reported Driving on Baghdad



Armored cars of a British RAF unit, "on the job" in Iraq where British forces are reported to be gaining an upper hand and driving swiftly upon Baghdad. A three-week old Iraq rebellion was believed collapsing and Iraq's pro-Axis premier has fled to German-held territory.
