

All White Chosen For Church Wedding

Down Everitt Becomes Bride of Ralph Bockmier Jr., in Beautiful Ceremony Held Saturday

All white was chosen by Dawn Anna Everitt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Whitlock, for her wedding at Sacred Heart church Saturday at twelve o'clock noon to Mr. Ralph Bockmier Jr., of Spokane, Washington. The Rev. Father Timothy Casey read the nuptial mass before several invited guests.

The altar was lavishly with lovely white peonies placed before sprays of white spring blossoms. Pains on either side, the lights from cones of white candles, small low sprays of flowers on the small altar and a bank of white flowers against the railing made it one of the loveliest of spring weddings. A white carpet led to the altar with tall white candles placed at alternate pews. White satin ribbon bows at the base of the candles were looped gracefully along the aisle.

Just before the ceremony Mrs. Rollin Central sang Gounod's "Ave Maria," with the choir singing the "Little Flower" mass. All music was in Latin. Lohengrin's procession, and Mendelssohn's recessional were played by the organist.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, Mr. Earl Whitlock, made a lovely picture in traditional bride's attire. Her gown was fitted with a high, simple neckline, full leg of tulle and a small train. The bodice started at the long waistline and the full skirt ending in a train. Her illusion net veil was held in place with a Juliet cap of seed pearls and in front fell to the knees, and in the back to a long train. She carried a white prayer book and two white orchids. The bride's only jewelry was an old gold chain and cross, a gift from the groom and had been his grandmother's.
