The talk given by the visifor was based on, "What Makes a Good Flower Arrange ment Good!" Mrs. McCullough emphasized three points:

First, suitability as to where the arrangement is to be plac-ed either in the home or in a flower show.

Second, one third of the percentages on points of goodness depends on good design and good design includes a good silhouette and an arrangement of units within the silhouette and the relation of plant material to the container.

Third, the good combination of textures

Mrs. McCullough spoke at length on color harmony, givper cent of the value of the arrangement. She discussed complimentary, mono-chroma tic, and analogous harmonies and this was particularly in-teresting with Mrs. McCullough illustrating her points.

Condition of plant material itself was stressed McCullough who advised the careful selection of blossoms, branches, or any other material used in the construction of an arrangement. These points she also illustrated de-lightfully. Backgrounds came in for much discussion and those used by Mrs. McCuilough were especially interesting
