"Germany, although victor, is ready to concede this sacred right and duty of every nation to the French themselves.

"Whether and in what man ner France may desire to throw onto the scales the weight of German-French relationships developed in the course of the past year is something one can not discuss theoretically. Only a practical case can show."

Anthorized sources declined to throw further light on yes-terday's meeting of Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini at the Brenner Pass.
"It is the custom for the two

statesmen both before and after all major events to meet in that spirit of solidarity which already has become historic to take stock of the past and check over plans for the future," it was asserted. "Their talks are rich in content."
