structions of the new pro-British government in Baghdad and eliminated all rebel resistance.

There was no indication tonight whether the Germans or the Iraqi rebels had succeeded in carrying out any sabotage to the Mosul and Kirkuk oil installations or the Kirkuk-Haifa pipeline before surrendering their holds on the regions.

The Berlin radio asserted several days ago that the Germans established in northern Iraq were prepared to damage the oil facilities if necessary, presumably by dynamiting the wells and pumping machinery.

said he believed the workers' policy committee would refuse to defer the strike deadline unless the NDMB should move up its hearing to Thursday.

One setback already faced the NDMB after the CIO workers union rejected for a third time a settlement formula in the strike of 12,000 western Washington logging camp workers.

O. M. Orton, president of the International Association of Woodworkers (CIO), who was summoned to Washington by the NDMB to explain an "unsatisfactory" reply to their peace request, said the board's proposal was a "labor busting and a strikebreaking device." Fifty lumber mills affected by the month-old strike previously accepted a government plan for resumption of work pending arbitration on the dispute. Orton said the "strike will last until workers obtain a decent living."

A showdown in the threatened renewal of a work stoppage in the soft coal fields was postponed until Thursday.

were only a few close members of his family—his second wife, Princess Hermine; his daughter, the Duchess of Brunswick, and his grandsons, Louis Ferdinand, Karl and Franz Joseph, and the latter's wife, Princess Henrietta.

The first kaiserin died April 11, 1921, and was buried at Potsdam.

The former emperor's eldest living son and successor as head of the Hohenzollern family, Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm, had been at his father's side earlier, but left late last week when the former kaiser seemed to rally.

It was reported here that the former emperor talked for several hours yesterday afternoon with his major domo, but showed signs of a relapse later, approached a crisis at 8 p. m., and shortly thereafter lost consciousness.

The Hohenzollern flag flew at half-staff from Castle Doorn. With Hitler's explicit permission, the flag of the former ruling Prussian house also flew at half-staff from The Netherlands palace, now the administration building of the Hohenzollern family, and from the palace of William I, both in Berlin.

Wilhelm was said to have expressed the wish that the only mourners at his funeral be innermost members of his family circle, but DNB said "some delegations from the reich are expected."

RAIL WORKERS DEMAND HUGE WAGE BOOST

The demands of both the "big five" and the 14 miscellaneous unions will be presented to the railroads formally on June 10. The labor organizations have asked approval of the wage gains effective July 10.

Rate Doubled

The proposed increases would virtually double the hourly wage rate for some 75,000 semi-skilled laborers, union spokesmen said. The council recommended a 70 cents hourly minimum for this class of workmen. The prevailing rate is 36 cents.

Highly-skilled railroad employees, under the proposal, would receive hourly rates up to \$1.13, or approximately 30 cents above current maximum levels.

Among the 830,000 employees embraced in today's action, the proposal would affect an annual wage gain of about \$300,000,000. Union spokesmen said the figure could not be set exactly, because of the part-time status of many employees.

Pepper's address to a meeting sponsored by the committee to defend America by aiding the allies, was broadcast nationally.

"If Hitler controls the markets of Europe, where shall we sell our surplus products of farms, factories, mines and forests? What will happen to the prices of cattle, wheat and corn? Hitler has it in his power to impoverish every American workman, farmer and businessman."

VICHY ISSUES PROTEST ON BRITISH 'PLAN'

The 85-year-old Marshal Pétain was said to have sought an explanation of decisions on a plan of "empire defense" taken in ministerial consultations yesterday and in conferences among Marshal Pétain, Vice-Premier Admiral Jean Darlan and General Maxime Weygand, chief of France's overseas defense forces.

Today's French official statements said also France has not sought any German or Italian aid in defending Syria where any British invasion will be met by French forces "single handedly."

The strictest kind of censorship prevailed, prohibiting correspondents from speculating on the course of French-German collaboration, but in formal quarters said that a "perfectly agreed plan" has been set up to defend Syria and Tunisia against further British attacks.

The forces left to France to defend her empire after the Compeigne armistice of a year ago were insufficient, as shown by the "Free French" seizure of the Congo, Chad and other African colonies, but Germany and Italy have recently enabled the French to greatly reinforce the overseas defense forces, it was stated.

cable" by both parties, but no agreement was reported.

While over 30 local employers have either acceded to or indicated their willingness to accept the union's month-old demands, eleven houses, including three of Main street's largest, have fought the proposed 50-cent boost.

In addition to the waitress and dishwasher increase, the alliance is asking a \$7 per day wage for male cooks, \$5.50 for bartenders, and \$9 for women cooks. All call for a half-dollar increase over the 1940-41 contract which expired May 31.

Association spokesmen, in releasing the compromise offer, pointed out that the \$3.20 scale would involve a 6.23 per cent raise. New bartender and cook wage levels would mean boosts of from eight to 11 per cent.

A report of Tuesday night's meeting and the new compromise plan would be presented to two meetings of the culinary membership today at 3 and 8 p. m. in the Labor temple.
