TO OUR SUBSCRIBERS.

When we purchased the Klamath Republican, we also bought the subscription list from June 1, 1899, and became entitled to all earned on subscription since that date.

We are informed that all money owing on subscription previous to June 1, 1899, is due to Mr. Loosley, who before that date owned the paper and then sold it (reserving the pay on the list up to that time) to the parties from whom we afterwards bought it.

After we bought the paper we had a talk with Mr. Loosley in relation to our taking his old list, but after receiving a few payments for time previous to June 1st, we concluded to have nothing further to do with it.

Hence we will state that so far as we are concerned, we are entitled only to payment from subscribers for the time since June 1, 1899. Mr. Loosley is only entitled to payment up to June 1, 1899, and neither he nor any one else outside of this office is authorized to collect or receive on subscription any amount earned after that date.

The 16 to 1 theory is a dying issue, providing it isn't already dead. People are convinced that there is enough money, if it is kept in circulation by confidence and plenty of business.

When the Philippine insurgents attacked our forces at Manila, there was only one course to pursue—defend ourselves and make the enemy submit. There is no ground for adverse arguments; the only thing to have done, is being done.

By her royalty and generosity in dishing out her wealth during the Spanish-American war and other late evidences of a liberal spirit, Miss Helen Gould is winning honor and rescuing her family name from the contempt, into which it had been plunged by her deceased father's persistent greed.

Because August frosts reduced crops hereabouts this year is no reason such will be the case next year or in many years to come. Such occasional damage is not to be compared in disastrous effect to the calamities which fall to the lot of eastern farmers. Among them, drouth, hail and cyclones often wreak ruin for several years in succession.

The report which was prevalent a few months ago that Admiral Dewey was opposed to the president in his Philippine policy, has been emphatically denied by the admiral, and a dispatch from Washington to the Chicago Times-Herald says that he gives his unqualified approval to the president's declaration that there shall be no faltering in maintaining the victory won by him in Manila bay. It appears therefore that the president and admiral are exactly in accord as to the course to be pursued with the Philippines. It means that the undertaking to suppress the rebellion will not be abandoned but will be continued with constantly increasing strength and vigor on land and sea until the revolting tribes have yielded to the United States. Indeed, what other course could now be pursued with honor.

THE "ANTIS."

It is beyond question, also, that our "antis" at home give the insurgents much encouragement; for they make them believe that they have only to hold out till congress shall meet in December, when there will be a revolution against further prosecution of the war. They try this hope should fail, they will try to drag the struggle on until the presidential campaign in this country, under the belief or hope inspired by our noisy "antis" that a change of policy will then be decreed. We have lost many soldiers and shall lose many more, through the encouragement thus given to the insurgents by our "Little American" faction. This is a subject upon which, in its present phase, there ought to be no debate. The first necessity is peace; and peace can be had only by compelling it. After that, it will be time to talk about the future government of the islands. The grossest assertion is that we want to "enslave" the people. We have first to establish the prestige and dignity of the American name. Every American ought to desire, by every instinct of self-respect and patriotism, the swift and signal triumph of his country in this situation. It is nothing to the purpose to quote Washington's farewell address; for Washington spoke over a hundred years ago, under conditions altogether different from those existing now. Besides, national ideas have grown and ex-

panded, since Washington's time. There is nothing in anything he ever said which indicates the faintest conception on his part of future possibilities equal to the actual present realization of this country, commercial and political. It never occurred to him, so far as any records shows, that the area of the United States would expand to the Pacific, with states having a coast line on the western, as long as that of his time on the eastern, ocean. Yet for his time Washington was a pretty good expansionist; since, from the beginning to the end of his public career, he endeavored to wrest the unknown wilderness of the Ohio valley from the French, and then from the English and their Indian allies. This, for a time, was more difficult than anything we are undertaking now. Men and ideas now leap oceans easier than they then crossed rivers; and the notion that American ideas cannot pass beyond this continent is a strange shortsightedness, reserved, fortunately, as we believe, to a small proportion of our people. It is not conceivable that congress will falter, or order a retreat.—Oregonian.

England and the Boers.

War between England and the Boers now seems certain. Whether right or wrong, the Boers will, in the nature of things, be overcome; they are not able to cope with so strong an antagonist. The situation seems to be this, according to the war correspondents of London newspapers: "The Boers, who evidently must see the efforts of the English government to avert hostilities until the arrival of reinforcements, having weeks ago planned a campaign, will put it in action perhaps as early as this week. They will probably avoid engagements, devoting their energies to the destruction of property and the capture of prisoners, perhaps a raid on Delagoa bay. It seems unlikely that they will attack via Laing's Nek and other passes of that country, for the simple reason that these points are so openly talked about as their probable points of aggression, keenest observers believing it to be more likely that the Boers will operate through Zululand, thus creating a diversion of the 15,000 British troops now chiefly massed at Ladysmith or in its neighborhood. In the meanwhile, or perhaps previous to this, a British army corps, consisting of 20,000 men or more, will be sent out. Parliament will be summoned, and no doubt the necessary supplies will be granted, though there will be some hot debating. "The negotiations, according to President Kruger's own statements and judging from all the available information, seems to have reached an impasse. Rumors of the interference of a foreign power continue to crop up, but the most sanguine scarcely believe this would turn the British from their determination, evident from the first, to attempt to compel President Kruger to submit absolutely to their terms, though speculation as to the possibility of the awkward complications which might ensue by German or Russian diversion in various parts of the globe."
