REPUBLICAN RESOLUTIONS.

At the recent meeting of the State Republican League, the following resolutions were adopted:

So long as either of the great political parties advocates the free coinage of silver, the financial question is the paramount question before the American people. The republican clubs of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, reaffirm their loyalty to the gold standard and their opposition to the free coinage of silver.

We believe the best and most stable dollar in the world should be assured

by legislation to the laborer as the fruit of his toil, and to the farmer as the price of his crop. We are in sympathy with the efforts of the republican senators and representatives in congress to enact legislation for this purpose.

We hereby heartily endorse the Philippine policy of the present administration. These islands have been won by American blood and purchased by American treasure. They should remain a permanent part of our national domain. We cannot neglect our duty to give them a stable government, nor can we afford to throw away the great opportunity they give us for the development of our Oriental trade.

We are opposed to the monopolization of commerce and industry by the trusts, and are in favor of all judicious legislation looking to the curtailment of their power.

A resolution in favor of electing United States senators by the direct vote of the people was adopted. Also a resolution requesting the war department to make provision for the removal of the Oregon soldiers, who died in the Philippines, to Oregon for burial.

An amendment to the constitution of the league was adopted, providing that the league shall meet every four years, instead of every two years.

Eastern journals assert that the Nicaragua canal bill now before congress, will soon pass both houses by large majorities. "A reliable poll shows that there are sixty two senators and 254 representatives in favor of action at this session; and one senator and twenty-nine representatives in favor of delay. This is a declared majority of more than two-thirds in the senate, and of nearly three-fourths in the house. Even this does not measure the strength of the movement of the canal, as many members who refused to state their position at present will undoubtedly vote for action when the time comes. Probably four-fifths of each house favors action at this session."

While it is generally believed that Oregon will go republican by a strong majority at the June election, too much assurance along this line is bound to create an apathy that will have a tendency to lower the majority instead of increase it. The very fact that the state will speak for republicanism should be the incentive that makes every republican feel it his duty to take off his coat and go to work in helping to roll up the biggest majority for the party ever recorded in the history of the state. Let every man who bears the stamp of republicanism upon his progressive brow stand valiantly by the party until after the election is over.—Eugene Register.
