MODOC WAR ANNIVERSARY.

The Alturas Plaindealer says that
Thursday, Jan. 18th, was the twenty-
seventh anniversary of the first bat-
tle with the Modoc Indians in the
lava beds. The fight began at day-
light and lasted until dark, when the
troops retreated. It was estimated
at the time that more than a ton of
lead was poured into Captain Jack's
stronghold. Yet incredible as it may
appear, but one Indian was hit,
while 42 soldiers and volunteers were
killed and wounded. The dead were
left where they fell, but the wounded
on one exception, were carried out.
Two men were killed in an attempt
to drag this poor fellow to a place of
safety. The spot where he lay was
left to the mercy of the merciless
savages. He belonged to Captain
Perry's troop of U. S. Cavalry. The
last battle was fought at Dry Lake,
during the progress of the war,
covering a period of six months, near-
ly 1000 men were killed—soldiers vol-
unteers and citizens—and were lost
in battle during the Spanish war in
money was more than \$4,000,000.
